Bob Jones $\quad \mathbf{4 V} \quad 4 \boldsymbol{v}$ or pass? It is very close, but we like $4 \boldsymbol{~}$.
Steve Vogel Pass If partner had 10 points or more, I would expect him/her to bid $4 \vee$ instead of $3 \vee$. There ARE hands where partner has less and we will still make game, but there are many more where we will not. I will take the higher probability route with this 6 -loser hand and pass.

Joe Muenks 4- While in standard you might pass concerned partner is broke, playing Lebensohl over weak 2's make this a clear cut game bid as partner is showing a less than game forcing but more than a minimum hand.

Bob Fisk 4v I play Lebensohl with my partners on this auction, so $3 \mathbf{4}$ shows $8+\mathrm{HCP}$ and $4+$ Hearts. With nothing wasted in Spades, that should give us excellent chances at making game. We're the bestest!

Steve Moese 4v Partner has 8-11 HCP and 4+ Hearts. With less they start with 2NT (Lebensohl). This popular treatment eliminates the advantage defenders have when opening a weak two bid.

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## Question 2

Bob Jones 3 It's a little aggressive but do it while you can. Bid 3 . Support with support!

Steve Vogel 3-Given the bidding, partner is marked with 4+ diamonds, so I will show my good support by making a 3 response at unfavorable vulnerability.

Joe Muenks 2a Playing standard, call 3 to show some values and a fit (partner is marked with 4 diamonds on this auction), which will give partner a clear cut suit to lead should west choose a major. Playing unusual over unusual, bid 3 also, which shows diamonds and less than 10 support points ( $2 \boldsymbol{1}$ would show $10+$ support points).

Bob Fisk 3 This shows a constructive Diamond raise, since I could cuebid 2 to show a limit+ raise in Diamonds. A cuebid of $2 \vee$ instead would show a hand with $5+$ Clubs and 10+ HCP (Five and Dime for you old timers).

Steve Moese 3 A constructive raise with 4 trumps.

Bob Jones Pass If partner didn't bid $3 \boldsymbol{A}$, you shouldn't either. Pass.
Steve Vogel Pass My minor suit honors are not well placed, and we may well run into a bad spade break. Best to pass.

Joe Muenks Pass Defense is not a curse word. Partner has denied 4 spades by passing over $3 \vee$ and you've denied 6 spades by passing over $2 \downarrow$ (yes, before the $3 \downarrow$ bid even gets a chance to be made).

Bob Fisk Pass I showed a hand with $12+\mathrm{HCP}$ and $5+$ Spades when I opened. Did I gain a Spade? Nope. Did I gain a significant amount of HCP's? Nope. When you've already bid your hand, don't keep bidding. Partner might have bid 2 with as little as $Q J x x x$ Qxx xxxxx, and the opponents are cold for $4 \vee$ losing one Spade, one Heart, and one Diamond. Heh.

Steve Moese Pass With 4 trumps it is partner's responsibility to compete to the 3 level. We have an 8 card fit. They haven't found a fit.

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Steve Vogel 4소 Some people play that a $3 \forall$ bid in this sequence is Stayman (to uncover a possible heart fit), but with this hand, I prefer a splinter in spades showing good club support and good values, as well as the shortness in spades. I envision a club small or grand slam.

Joe Muenks 3 I think this hand will play in 6 clubs most days, but let's bid 3 to show a suit that is normally 5 cards without 2 of the top 3 honors to help partner judge her next move. The key is to pull $3 N T$ to 4 should partner bid that next.

Bob Fisk 49 The most important features of my hand are (1) 3+ card Club support with an honor, (2) a singleton Spade, and (3) strong slam interest. 4a pretty much shows all three in one bite (munch). Picture partner with Qxx AK Kx AQJTxx, although their hand is probably better than that. If partner thinks that I have Spades and want to play in 4@, I'll get a new partner.

Steve Moese 3 A natural bid unless playing cheaper minor second negative. Ugh. Then we need to bid 2NT instead. Ugh. When there are two Ughs we look for a better choice. 3 here should be Stayman asking for partner's 4-card major. 3* allows for a 4-crad major. With a strong hand and 4 M and $5+\mathrm{D}$, start opener rebids 3 M (artificial showing longer diamonds). But that convention is for another day.

Bob Jones 4V You don't really have any slam interest, so don't bother bidding 2NT, which might allow a 3e bid by West for a good lead or sacrifice. Just bid 4 .

Steve Vogel 4V Could partner have enough for a heart slam? It would take the MA, AA and club shortness or $\vee \mathrm{A}, \mathrm{AJ}$ of clubs and still there might be a diamond loser. I don’t have the tools to find out about these lower percentage holdings without getting too high.

Joe Muenks 2NT If you're strict that no preempt will contain an off-suit ace you can bid $4 \vee$ directly, but that is so 1990's. Nowadays we bid $2 \uparrow$ on such a wide variety of hands let's learn more about partner's hand first. (Playing matchpoint pairs, bidding $4 V$ is still likely the best approach since exploring slam might expose the club weakness.)

Bob Fisk 4v Partner can't have enough for us to make 6 $\boldsymbol{4}$, and we aren't interested in hearing what the opponents have to bid if I start with 2NT (i.e., they probably have a good sacrifice in 5\%). Picture partner with $x x$ Axxxxx xx xxx, and bid what you expect to make.

Steve Moese 4- Partner would need xx AQxxxx xx Ax to make 6 attractive, and that; not a weak two opening bid.

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## Question 6

Q 6 - East-West vulnerable

Bob Jones 2 It is a tad aggressive, but if your system has a bid to show both majors, this would be a reasonable time to use it. For us, it is $2 \boldsymbol{2}$.

Steve Vogel Pass With better spade intermediates (at least KQ109x), I would trot out a nonvulnerable 2id and hope for the best, but not with this hand.

Joe Muenks Pass 1NT can be harder to make than it looks sometimes, so I hate to turn a plus into a minus with the $3^{\text {rd }}$ highest card in my suit a 7 . If the $\mathbf{~ K}$ was the $\mathbf{\vee}$ K I'd reel out my both major suits bid, which varies by partner.

Bob Fisk 2 (Both majors). I play Revised Cappelletti in pass-out seat over a strong 1NT opening. Bidding 2 might be right, but that usually results in catching partner with xx AQTx xxxx xxx. Sigh.

Steve Moese $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ There are many ways to bid over the opponent's one notrump opening bid. Here a double showing a single suited minor or both majors works very well - it protects against partner's possible penalty hand and gets us to compete in the majors.
