Bob Fisk N/A I refused to answer, because I play that a $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ bid over partner's 1 m opening shows exactly five Spades, four Hearts, and invitational values. Cute, huh? When you have that agreement, the following sequence shows an invitational hand with 5-5 in the majors: 1m-1ヵ; 1NT-2 (Alert); 2 (Alert)-2 . Bridge is easy!

Steve Vogel 1v My plan is to rebid 2NT over partner's expected response of 14 or 1NT. This hand, with 17 HCP and a good 5-card heart suit, values out to $18+$ points, which is why I choose not to open 1NT.

Joe Muenks 1NT Epls. With 2 small clubs I cannot upgrade this to 18, though many 17 HCP hands with a 5 -card suit will open 1 of a suit and rebid 2NT. (I'm predicting half the commenters open $1^{-1}$ and jump in NT next.)

Steve Vogel 2e If I had a minimum hand, I would rebid 24. This hand, with heart shortness, values out at more than 14 points in a suit contract, so my plan is to support partner's spades with my next bid, showing my 3-1-5-4 shape with extras. There is a chance that partner could pass over my 2 rebid, but you cannot cover all contingencies.

Joe Muenks 24 Epls. There are so many people who play 2NT over this auction asking for opener's hand, but always find partner with 4 trump since they hesitate to raise on 3 , the reason the convention came into being in the first place. Standard players bid 2 here.

Bob Fisk 24 If partner bids 2NT (Spiral), I can bid 3 to show a maximum hand with only three Spades. If I raise partner's major with only three, I'll have shortness somewhere (i.e., I'm not doing it on AQx xx J9xx AKTx).

Steve Moese $2 \underline{2 \boldsymbol{e}}$ - or $2 \boldsymbol{i c}$ when playing Wold/spiral ask by opener. I have no rebid problem after 2\& works when partner can ask about my trump length and strength. Without that, raising on three is ok but partner needs to be comfortable playing a 4-3 fit in game. After $2 \boldsymbol{\&}$, if partner passes we are in a good spot. If partner bids $2 \boldsymbol{\circ}$ or 2 we answer with 24 showing $3=1=5=4$ and $14+$. Steve Moese 2NT We have invitational values and a major flaw. Passing could be right but partner just might have enough for game. The risk we take is pushing partner to 3*.
