Bob Jones 2NT Double is out with a singleton club. Pass, 24, and 2NT all have flaws, but we like 2 NT best.

Steve Vogel 2NT Yes, not perfect due to the singleton club, but I am not willing to pass with this $15+$ point hand hoping that partner will reopen with a takeout double. The alternative of a takeout double of my own with a singleton club seems like a worse alternative to the notump overcall.

Joe Muenks 2NT I'm very strict that you don't open NT with a singleton. But overcalling or when a preempt occurs, some hands require you to take liberties to show your strength and values in their suit. I consider this one of those hands.

Steve Moese 2NT Flip a coin and choose pass or 2NT here. Mine came up 2NT. Passings risks that partner will not reopen when we have game or a good spade fit. By the way, 2NT as an offer to play here is natural, even with a small singleton. Good to know the rules.

Bob Jones 3e You probably want to be in 3NT if partner has a spade stopper, but don't bid 24. That shows a heart fit. Just describe your hand. Bid 3\%.

Steve Vogel 3i My partners and I play that a new suit bid by advancer following a pass by responder is forcing for one round. Partner can now rebid a 6 -card suit, bid 3NT with a spade stopper or do something else appropriate.

Joe Muenks 2人 I'll start with a cue bid to see what partner thinks. If they retreat to 3『, I'll bid 4V. (Note that I can't bid 3\% since I play that as non-forcing meaning partner knows if I have a fine opener I might not have hearts when cue bidding.)

Steve Moese 24 Somewhat old school. I prefer the "cue only non force" approach so $2 \boldsymbol{4}$ shows either an invitational raise or a GF with my own suit. I hope partner has a spade stopper for NT.

Bob Jones 30 Many would have overcalled with this hand. We applaud your pass, but don't go wild now. This hand is worth an invitation, so bid $3 \bullet$ to show that.

Steve Vogel 30 My partners and I play that a cuebid of the higher of the opponents' suits shows 4+ card support and a limit raise (a cuebid of the lower suit shows 3-card support and a limit raise).

Joe Muenks $\quad \mathbf{3 0}$ I'll start with a cue bid to announce some strength before driving to 40. I want partner to double at the 5 level if they choose (but if I jump to 4 now, she won't know to double or bid on). Also, my partners overcall with a good suit or good values. We know partner has strength given her suit is lacking.

Steve Moese 39 So far this is an 18 Trump hand (we have 10 and they have 8). That means if we make 9 tricks, they make 9 tricks. We go positive if they pass, double or bid $4 \bullet$. I like that parlay. 40 risks going negative when they go down. If I had a red suit singleton I bid 4 not 3. Two low tripletons in the red suits are a warning. If west bids game over $3 \boldsymbol{L}$ we pass. We bid to the level we wish to preempt immediately. We do not rescue the opponents. I do not fault many who bid 4 here.

Bob Jones 4థ This hand has potential but leave further adventures to partner. Bid 4థ.

Steve Vogel 4NT Despite my questionable opener, once partner shows 4+ card support and slam interest by showing the Ace of Hearts, I believe we are odds-on favorites for a small slam, and grand slam is possible. If partner (who is unlimited) has 3 Aces and the King of clubs, I plan to bid grand slam. Unfortunately, I do not have the tools to uncover a singleton club in partner's hand along with checking for keycards.

Joe Muenks 4NT Partner denies the $\downarrow$ A, but that's ok he's made a slam move, let's check keycards and go slamming. I'll note (like everyone else), this shoulda gone 14-2NT-3*-30 and partner is deciding whether there's slam, knowing you are cooperating.

Steve Moese 4쓴 Partner denies first or second round control of the minor suits with their heart control bid. We have a control in both, but appear to have 2 minor suit losers. I envision partner's hand to be AQJx AKx J10xx Q9x or something similar. Effective cue bidding shows Aces or Kings up the line. With AQJx Axxx KJ10x Kx I expect partner to launch the keycard ask. With either AQJx Axx Axxx Qx or AQJx Axx Jx KJxx I expect a minor suit control bid, not $4 \cdot$.

Bob Jones 3NT This hand is too good to invite. Bid 3NT.
Steve Vogel 3NT I have 9 HCP and great intermediates. The one drawback is a singleton diamond, but that could doom 2NT as well as 3NT. At imps, I would bid 3NT without question. At matchpoints, this is a closer decision. Still, I value this hand at 10 points, so I would choose to bid game.

Joe Muenks 2NT In teams just bid 3NT, but in pairs make your invite. I'm sure Billy is valuing up given the heart run and AT9x in one suit, while others are explaining how often 15 occurs vs 17 (like 2 to 1 ), so I'll go middle of the road in pairs.

Steve Moese 2NT Continue our original bidding plan. Invite.

Bob Jones 1NT Bid 1NT. That shows the same thing even after both opponents have bid. Some use the bid as a weak take out, but what do you do with a good hand like this?

Steve Vogel 1NT I have stoppers in both of the opponents' suits, and I prefer to limit my hand so partner can have the most information for competitive bidding, which is why I would choose a 1NT overcall over a more ambiguous double.

Joe Muenks $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ With most partners I'm stuck doubling and passing the response, lacking 17 support pts. But, curiously, playing with new players OR expert partners I'll bid 1NT natural here showing a good NT opener with values in their suits.

Steve Moese 1NT A natural overcall. Sandwiches bids belong to passed hands.
