Bob Jones $\underline{X} \quad$ You will probably not outbid them on this deal, but don't sell out too low. Double, for takeout of course.

Steve Vogel $\underline{\mathbf{X}}$ The opponent's takeout double typically shows 12+ points and the jump response shows 9-11 points. In summary, the opponents have shown at least 21 points between them and I have 15 HCP. Partner likely has 0-4 HCP. Still, I have great intermediates as well as great distribution. Without both of these I would pass.

Joe Muenks Pass So, the opponents almost surely have a spade game but often they might miss it if we just leave them to their own devices.

Bob Fisk $\quad \underline{X} \quad$ I didn't pick up my hand to play in $2 \boldsymbol{A}$.
Steve Moese $\underline{X} \quad$ Takeout with extras
Mike Ma 2NT X seems obvious, but the danger with this hand is that you have a spade void, and would not like seeing partner passing under duress, and your side defending against their 9-card fit. Especially since doubler may still have a good hand. OTOH, your partner can have 5 clubs and can't act over the initial double of $1 \star$. I am giving up on hearts (partner with both majors would probably have bid over $1 \forall X$ ), and hope partner will come with the right decision on which minor to choose. They will compete in spades anyway. Who knows, maybe my 2NT would find us a good sack in 5* over their 4\&.

Bob Jones $\underline{X} \quad$ Double. It is not perfect, but better than $2 \star$. Should partner bid clubs, pass and hope he has 6 of them.

Steve Vogel $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ My partners and I play equal level conversion, which means that if partner responds 2 to my double, I can bid $2 \geqslant$, which shows diamonds and hearts but no extra values over a normal takeout double.

Joe Muenks 2 Depending on the system you are playing, you might double and pull 2 es to $2 \diamond$, but in standard you can either balance your best suit or double and allow partner to bid and play in if they don't bid a red suit. If opener bids back to me, I can now back in with a double.

Bob Fisk $\underline{X} \quad$ I play equal-level conversion with my partners, so if I double 1 M and partner bids $2 \boldsymbol{\&}, I$ can correct to $2 \Downarrow$ without showing extras. Partner will suspect that I have five diamonds and four hearts. Partner isn't a passed hand on this auction (i.e., partner could easily have a balanced 13 count). Picture partner with Axx $Q J x x$ QJx Kxx, making $4 \curlyvee$ unless the opponents negotiate their diamond ruff.

Steve Moese X Borrow a king from partner and we must bid. Double is flexible. 2 on a ratty suit will get what it deserves. Consider playing Equal Level Conversion - if partner bids $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ you can then correct to $2 \diamond$ to show $4=5$ in the reds.

Mike Ma $\underline{X} \quad$ The prevalent wisdom is you "borrow" a king from partner when you balance. So I have enough to $X$. What if partner bids $2 \&$ ? I will bid $2 \diamond$ equal level conversion, not showing extra. I Partner would know I have this shape or similar. I would like my diamonds to be better, but you can't always have the perfect hand.

Bob Jones 4V Don't dream about a slam. Even game might be difficult to make. Bid 4 4.

Steve Vogel 2NT (Ogust) Partner's first position favorable vulnerability weak two bids can be pretty light, so I do not want to automatically bid 4४. If partner responds $3 \boldsymbol{4}$, I will rebid $3 \uparrow$. Otherwise, I will bid 4४.

Joe Muenks 2NT I'll ask about partner's hand before deciding my next move. Unsure if you are tired reading history lessons, but in the 1990's we won't have 2 aces to preempt so we'd just bid $4 \uparrow$ now.

Bob Fisk 2NT If partner shows a bad suit with a bad hand (Ogust), I'll sign off in $3 \boldsymbol{\nabla}$. Any other answer, and we're in game. Picture Qxx QJTxxx x Kxx.

Steve Moese 2NT if partner has a good hand, we bid 4『. If they have a good suit, we still bid $4 \uparrow$. If they open weak twos like I do, we go down in $3 \uparrow$. (;)

Mike Ma 3NT My choices include 2NT Ogust, 3» (forcing), 4४, and 3NT. I am certainly not passing with a Mel 19 (hcp + number of hearts) including trump king. Problem is white vs red, $2 \vee$ may often be 5 -card suit and/or bad suit. If opener has a good suit ( 6 with 2 of top 3 ), I actually want to play 3NT counting on 6 heart tricks, giving me 8 on a spade lead. If opener has 5 , I would want to be in NT. If he has bad 6 , I probably want to play $4 \uparrow$. But I have no way of finding out 5 vs 6 unless I play 5 -card Ogust, so I just bid 3NT. If it bad at least it is painless for partner. By the way, if you open 5-card weak 2 often, you may consider playing 5-card Ogust.

Bob Jones 1母 This hand is strong enough to rebid 2NT, but the distribution is slightly off. Bid 14.

Steve Vogel 2NT My hand values out to 18 points, and with my balanced distribution, I prefer a rebid of $2 N T$ over a reverse to $2 \leftrightarrow$ which would imply an unbalanced hand. If partner has 4a, he/she can check back for a fit with a 3 bid over 2NT.

Joe Muenks 14 I play 2a is a game force. Given we might be in a mismatch, I'll make the bid showing 12-18 and is nearly forcing instead.

Bob Fisk 2 $\underline{\text { a }}$ I play this as a reverse—not a game-forcing jump shift. I'd rather have more flexibility in bidding, so I don't need more game-forcing bids. I like to play that partner's rebid of 2 NT is the only forcing rebid partner has (i.e., $3 \boldsymbol{*}, 3$, $3 \boldsymbol{4}$, and $3 \boldsymbol{4}$ are all non-forcing). If partner does bid 2NT, I'll bid 3NT to show 4-2-5-2 shape. Bridge is easy!

Steve Moese 14 This 5-loser needs help from partner. If they rebid 1NT (5-9) we invite with $2 N T$. If they raise spades, we bid game. If they jump rebid in hearts, we bid $4 \vee$. If they rebid $2 \downarrow$, we choose to invite with $2 N T$.

Mike Ma 2NT I assume I did not open 1NT because I upgraded my hand. With Kx in both my doubletons, opening NT seems natural to do with 4 M and 5 m . Given that, why should I change my mind now after $1 \mathbb{V}$ ? The best rebid by opener is one that sufficiently limits her hand on both low and high ends. A 1a rebid showing 12-18 or so is the worst rebid for responder to hear.

Bob Jones 4V Any bid except 3NT would show 3 hearts, but this hand is not strong enough for any bid but 4V.

Steve Vogel 4V Given partner's expected shortness in diamonds, I would normally prefer $4 \vee$ to $3 N T$ (unless partner has the $\star A$ or $\forall K$, which I cannot know). Also, if partner is slammish, he/she is more likely to be encouraged by a heart raise.

Joe Muenks 4V Curiously we will bid an ace, agreeing hearts, along the way if we have one. Here we're happy to sign off unless partner makes a further move towards slam.

Bob Fisk 4- Partner showed four spades and five hearts. We have an 8-card heart fit, so $4 \vee$ it is. If you rebid $3 N T$, I'm hoping that partner holds Axxx KQJxx x Jxx, and you take only eight tricks on a diamond lead. Heh.

Steve Moese 4오 A control bid for hearts (cannot have 4 spades). Partner might be Axxx KQxxx x Axx and slam looks very good. If we simply bid $4 \vee$ partner will face a difficult choice. Make partners choices easy.

Mike Ma 4e You are going to play in hearts, but at this point responder is still unlimited, so a wooden $4 \vee$ raise would not be useful for her. With my major cards and my honor combinations in minors, I have a good hand for hearts in spite of only 15 hcp . "cue" 4e showing that and let partner in on the "joke". The question is what to do over a $4 \diamond$ bid by partner.

Bob Jones Pass This had not gone the way you wanted, but what can you do? Pass.
Steve Vogel 2 Despite the likelihood that partner has a club suit, with this hand, I believe a diamond contract will often play better than notrump, and partner will have decent support a fair amount of the time.

Joe Muenks Pass We might make more diamonds since partner rates to have 3 more often than 2 , but we'll likely score better in no trump.

Bob Fisk Pass What else? Partner holds $x x x$ Qxx xx KJxxx.
Steve Moese 2 (though a pass in Match Points is ok). The worst shape partner can be is $3=3=2=5$. (1NT often holds club length). Now imagine $2=3=4=4$, where do you want to be?

Mike Ma Pass Even in these days of inverted minors, so that partner cannot make a single raise with diamonds, chances are high that partner has clubs. So the singleton is not a big worry if at all. If $I$ bid $2 *$, I deserve to find partner with $3=3=1=6$.
