Bob Jones 34 You might belong in hearts, no trump, or diamonds. It is too soon to decide. Bid 3 and see what partner does. Pass if he bids 3NT.

Steve Vogel 30 My partners and I play that the $3 \vee$ bid accepts the game invitation and shows $5+$ hearts (not $6+$ ). Partner is still unlimited, so I am not sure where we should play. For now, I will show my spade stopper and await partner's next bid. I would plan on passing 3NT or 4 4.

Joe Muenks 4- Plenty of trump, plenty of tricks.
Bob Fisk 4V Partner's $3 \times$ bid is $100000 \%$ forcing--partner is merely showing their extra heart (or Hearts). If partner doesn't want you to bid again, partner could have passed. So there.

Steve Moese 34 Partner has forced to game with at least 5 hearts. But what game? 34 allows partner to decide whether $3 N T, 4 \vee$, or $5 \diamond$. By the way, with 4 spades we do not rebid 3 over partner's 1Y.

Mike Ma 3NT First, $3 \vee$ was forcing. Second, it showed $5+$ hearts, not $6+$. Third, with 8 tricks in your hand, 3 was in a way an underbid in spite of only 13 points. You survived that, but now what? You only need one trick from partner to make 3NT if opponents don't take 5 first. But you have two outside suits to worry about, clubs and spades. Normally you would do "one ask, two tell", but there is no way to address clubs now, so is 3 asking or telling? Unfortunately, the method I use is to ignore the suit(s) you can't address, and treat 3 (only suit left) as asking, not telling. $3 \boldsymbol{\phi}$ telling would work better here (more flexible, allowing you to get to $4 \vee$ on $5-2$ fit or 5 or even slam if right). C'est la vie.

Bob Jones 2上 This hand is just a hair short of a 3 bid, Bid $2 \boldsymbol{4}$.

Steve Vogel 24 I have a nice hand with working high cards, but I view it as just short of a jump raise to 3 .

Joe Muenks 2人 We're at a max for our bid, but the hand does not have enough upgrades to bid more. If partner has game interest, they can ask if I'm min or max.

Bob Fisk 29 Don't get carried away and bid 34. Partner could be as weak as xxxx Qxx KJxx xx and you'll struggle in 24. If partner bids 2NT (Spiral) asking about the quality of your raise, feel free to upgrade and bid 4-2-2-5 shape). If partner does bid 2NT, you're hoping they hold QTxx Kxx Jxx AJx. Sweet!

Steve Moese 24 A simple raise is just right.
Mike Ma 3, In spades, you are worth 17 support points, with both doubletons counting, and your nice spade suit and 5-card club suit headed by KQ (too bad the spot cards are so poor. If you consider that you would bid 2 with Kxxx, Axx, Qxx, Kxx, you can see what an underbid 24 with this hand would be.

Bob Jones Pass Pass. Thinking would be an overbid!
Steve Vogel Pass I have a minimum opener and the best way to convey this to partner is to pass. Any offensive rebid would show extras, which I do not have.

Joe Muenks Pass Partner will compete with 2 spades and a smattering, or stretch to double for takeout with both minors.

Bob Fisk Pass Bidding $3 \boldsymbol{2}$ here shows a better hand. Remember: you have a partner who's completely capable of inviting you back in the auction with a balancing double.

Steve Moese Pass We have a balanced minimum hand. That's what a pass shows.
Mike Ma $\quad \mathbf{X} \quad \mathrm{X}$ is for takeout and does not promise a good hand other than you don't have garbage. You would prefer to have 5=1=(34), but partner should not bid 3 m with a 5 card suit and 2 spades. As an aside, this is another example of the problem with playing Bergen raises. If partner bids 3 m now, does she have a weak hand with a long minor or an invitational hand?

Bob Jones $3 \boldsymbol{3}$ Bid 3 pre-emptive, showing 4-card support and 5-7 points. Perfect.

Steve Vogel 3- Yes, I would prefer to have better distribution to make a vulnerable preemptive raise, but this bid best describes my hand and makes it harder for the competition to judge their best spot.

Joe Muenks 2v I play this as 5-7 support points as part of my BROMAD structure, a little stronger than some folks play.

Bob Fisk 3V (preemptive). This isn't going to do anything, since your opponents have the boss suit, but you have to bid it anyway.

Steve Moese 3V Preempt. if we have another bid for a 4-card constructive raise we wait for that hand. This one isn't it. Take air out of their auction. Use 2NT for invites or GF heart raises.

Mike Ma 3V They surely have 8+ spades, especially for those who play Flannery. You are not selling out to $2 \boldsymbol{\alpha}$ even if they settle there, so why let them explore cheaply. Put the pressure on. Sure, you would like to have a singleton for your bid, but it is very hard to them to $X$ you when your side has good trumps. If you get $X$, put a spade in with your clubs and tell your partner you thought you had singleton spade. ();

Bob Jones Pass This hand, with $21 / 2$ "quick tricks", would have been an opening bid 60 years ago. Some modern experts are starting to open with this hand again. For most of us, however, pass.

Steve Vogel Pass I am not opening this hand 14 vulnerable with no high cards in my longest suit. I would not be surprised if more aggressive players choose otherwise, as a 14 opening bid has preemptive value.

Joe Muenks 19 Only 19 when applying the rule of 20/22, one of my favorite guidelines, but shhhhhh, I'm still opening it.

Bob Fisk Pass 14 (or psych 1\%), but I'm four times that age, so I'll pass like a real person. If you open 14, I hope your partner holds Kx KJxxxx KQx xx, and you end up in some outrageous contract going down a buttload (that's a bridge phrase).

Steve Moese Pass Not enough for a first seat bid.
Mike Ma Pass No idea what this question is about. It does not even satisfy Joe's Rule of $20 / 22$. Your poor suit is spades, so it is not like they can shut you out if you Pass. If it is hearts, you may have some concern. Anyway, if you open hands like this, your partnership better adjust your criteria for a limit raise and GF 2/1 bids.

Bob Jones 14 Raising hearts is a good idea, but with a 4-card spade suit, raising will have to wait. Bid 14.

Steve Vogel 19 My partners and I will not bypass a 1 d rebid to show a balanced minimum by bidding 1NT. Even if I were tempted to do so, my club holding would dissuade me. Also, if notrump is our best contract, it will likely play better from partner's side.

Joe Muenks 14 I have no problem raising with 3 card support when needed, but this hand should continue our description.

Bob Fisk 19 I have no reason to hide my 4-card Spade suit. My partners and I all play XYZ, so these auctions are easy to sort out (i.e., I don't need to bid 1NT and hope partner fishes for a better contract with 4-4 in the majors and a 10 count).

Steve Moese 19 Save the raise on three for more shapely hands without a future in spades.

Mike Ma 19 With a weaker hand I would raise to $2 \vee$ now. But I consider my hand good enough to bid 14 now rather than raise to $2 \vee$. If partner bids $1 N T$, I will bid $2 \vee$ which should show this hand. If partner passes 1 4 , the worst that can happen is we play 14 with 4-3 fit instead of $2 \vee$ with 5-3. If partner has an invitation+ hand, XYZ should take care of things.
