Bob Jones $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad 1 \mathrm{NT}$, in the pass-out seat, shows 11-14. Start with double, planning to bid NT over partner's expected spade response.

Steve Vogel 1NT Overcalling 1NT (15-18) with a singleton king in a side suit is not optimal, but it is the best alternative with this hand. A takeout double is not acceptable with short spades and no 5 -card suit, and passing with this strength is equally unacceptable. I would also not consider 2NT (unusual showing the red suits) with this strength and only 4-card suits.

Joe Muenks 1NT It's a little chunky and a little off-shape but feels right. When partner transfers to spades I'll feign 2 and bid normally. The singleton king will play as well as 2 small, I'm sure.

Bob Fisk 2NT (18-19 HCP). In balancing position, 1NT shows 11-14 HCP. If you hold 15-17, and your LHO has opened a minor, you can double and then bid 1NT over partner's expected major-suit response. With 18-19, you can bid 2NT immediately. Don't let your singleton spade affect your decision-is your hand really that much different than K2 KQ65 AJQ3 KT8? Don't answer that-it isn't.

Steve Moese $\underline{X} \quad$ 1NT balancing in fourth seat is 11-14. Double then bid NT if partner bids spades. Otherwise we have a raise of their suit bid.

Mike Ma $\underline{X} \quad$ If partner bids 14 to my $X$, I will bid $1 N T$. In direct seat, I don't have a problem with overcalling 1NT with the singleton spade, but this hand is too strong for a balancing 1NT of 19.

Bob Jones 2NT The 5-card suit makes this hand worth a promotion. Open 2NT.
Steve Vogel 2NT 19 HCP and a good 5-card suit translates to 20 points and a 2NT opener.
Joe Muenks 2NT I do get a point from problem 1, right? Anyway, there are so many upgrades that this will play as 20 . Also after partner's transfer, I want to keep this hand hidden.

Bob Fisk 2NT Compare this hand with J52 A93 AKQJ KQ4. The second one has 20 HCP , but the first hand is better, since you have a fifth diamond. Go ahead and upgrade this one and open 2NT.

Steve Moese 1 Intending to rebid 2NT. Yes, 2NT is a possible upgrade here, and I would do it except that bid will stop us finding a possible diamond slam.

Mike Ma 2NT This hand cries for an upgrade to 2NT. Not enough for upgrading to 2\& for me.

Bob Jones 1- No 5 -card suit and no reason to promote. Open $1 \$$, planning to rebid 2NT.

Steve Vogel 1 I plan to rebid 2NT over partner's expected one a major response.
Joe Muenks 1 EPLS. Not so many upgrades this time, so let's open 1 and plan to jump to 2 NT or raise 1 NT to 2 NT on this one.

Bob Fisk 1- I was thinking that 2NT was going to be the answer to every question, but I was mistaken. You'll rebid 2NT over any 1 -level response from partner. If your LHO (or RHO) bids a suit at the one level and your partner doesn't bid, you'll rebid 1 NT showing 18-19 HCP. Bridge is easy!

Steve Moese 1 Standard. Some open 1 with 4=4 minors.
Mike Ma 1 This hand unlike the one above, is not worth upgrading. At our club, people open $1 \diamond$ with $4-4 \mathrm{~m}$, so I do that planning on rebidding 2 NT over 1 M response.

Bob Jones 1 Reverse auctions are awkward and should be avoided when possible. Can't avoid it here. Open $1 \downarrow$, planning to reverse into $2 \boldsymbol{\psi}$.

Steve Vogel 1-With only 16HCP but top honors in my two suits, I view this hand as barely meeting the requirements for a reverse, and I plan to rebid $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ over partner's expected 14 response. If instead, partner bids $1 \boldsymbol{Y}$, I would make a splinter rebid of $\mathbf{3}$. If my distribution were instead 2-4-5-2, I would choose to open 1NT.

Joe Muenks 1 While an HCP short I like all my top honors in my suits so I'll plan my $2^{\text {nd }}$ bid as a reverse over the expected 14 response.

Bob Fisk 1- Not sure why this one is in here, since everyone (outside of the Precision players) will open $1 \downarrow$. If partner bids $1 \vee$ (ooo-la-la), bid 4 (splinter). If partner bids 1 S or 1 NT , you'll rebid $2 \boldsymbol{Y}$ (reverse). Your hand is good enough to introduce your heart suit even if partner passes the first time. In actuality, I'd bid my hearts even if the auction goes $1 \%$-(Pass)-Pass-(Pass), although my opponents might call the director on that one.

Steve Moese 1- The interesting question is whether we rebid a 2 reverse next or not.
Mike Ma 1- Opening 1NT with small singleton is not legal in less than 6 board round. And even if it is, this hand is suit oriented. Reverse into $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ over $1 \boldsymbol{A}$. 1 NT is the one bid you do not want to hear from partner.

Bob Jones 1NT Modern tournament players would bid 1NT, forcing, planning to bid 3 next to show an invitation with precisely 3-card support. Charles Goren would have bid $2 \boldsymbol{2}$. Neither is wrong.

Steve Vogel 1NT (forcing) Having 11 HCP and 3-card heart support, my plan is to show a 3-card limit raise by starting with a forcing 1NT response, then jumping in hearts following partner's expected 2 -level response ( $2 \boldsymbol{2}, 2 \vee$ or $2 \vee$ ). I am not overly troubled by my 3-3-3-4 shape.

Joe Muenks 1NT EPLS. How about a 1NT forcing followed by a jump in hearts for a 3-card limit raise in 2/1. In standard, bid 2*, then jump in hearts. We hate 4-3-3-3, true, but this is still 11 HCP so we must give a limit raise.

Bob Fisk $\quad \underline{\mathbf{2 v}}$ Although it's probably anti-field, I can't bring myself to treat this as a 3card limit raise. Picture partner with Axx Axxxx Qxx KJ. That's a 14 count, and I have 11, so there's game, right? Um, nope. With these hands, we're losing one spade, one heart, and two diamonds. For you losing-trick counters, this one has nine. That's a lot. For the rest of you, your 4-3-3-3 shape with no Tens should get your attention.

Steve Moese 27 Yes we have 11 HCP. But we also have 9 losers. The 3=3=3=4 shape is discouraging. We can always accept a game try by partner.

Mike Ma $\quad$ 1NT Forcing 1NT. Surely a limit raise in spite of 3334. I don't have special method for bidding 3-card limit raise, so I begin with 1 NT and bid $3 \checkmark$ next.

Bob Jones 2- This hand is a dead minimum, but you can't pass with 4-card diamond support. Bid $2 \uparrow$.

Steve Vogel 2- With a definitive diamond fit, I believe it is a must to compete further despite my minimum holding, and knowing that partner has at most 2 spades. The greatest risk is that I may push the opponents into a makeable game or a better heart contract, but I view either of those as unlikely.

Joe Muenks 2- EPLS. Partner promises 4 diamonds now, so bid as low as possible in our known fit. (We only open with 3 diamonds when $4-4$ in the majors, so when partner did not bid $2 \downarrow$, she must have $4+$ diamonds then.)

Bob Fisk 2 You know you have at least an 8-card diamond fit, so go ahead and bid again. You aren't showing extras-you'd double with a better hand.

Steve Moese 2-We have an 8 -card fit. Let partner know. (Partner didn't bid 2 so they don't have only 3 diamonds. They can't be $4=4=3=2$ ).

Mike $\mathrm{Ma} \quad$ 2 I know partner has $4+$ diamonds (we open 1 with 3 only if 4432 ), and opps have $7+$ club fit. In the worst scenario, we have 8 and they have 7 , where LoTT would still say not to defend (one side makes 2 and the other down 1, and we are NV). I have rock minimum, and partner does not even have 3 spades, but the $\$ 9$ is worth something. $2 \diamond$ is pretty wide ranging, so hopefully partner is not the type that would suddenly bid game just because I show a diamond fit (don't laugh).
