Bob Jones $\underline{\mathbf{2 v}}$ In first chair, not vulnerable, we like opening $2 \boldsymbol{V}$.
Steve Vogel Pass Some will open this hand with a weak two bid, especially with 6 hearts (as opposed to 6 spades). I prefer my equal vulnerability weak two bids to have a decent suit, which is not the case here.

Joe Muenks Pass If this is the first hand of the day I'll pass. Later in the day, might depend on my need to get aggressive. I don't want a heart lead. I want partner to declare if they have a 1NT or 2NT opener. But I kinda want to preempt because most of the field is. Hope I'm right.

Bob Fisk Pass Nothing wrong with $2 \boldsymbol{v}$, it's simply not my style unless I'm at favorable vulnerability. Make my hand x JT98xx T9x AJx and it's an entirely different story.

Steve Moese Pass Even playing Ogust, this suit is too bad for a weak 2.
Mike Ma $\quad \underline{2 V}$ Whether you can open weak $2 \vee 1$ st seat $N V$ with this suit is between you and your partner. If your agreement is that you cannot, don't do it no matter how much you are tempted.

Bob Jones $\underline{2 \boldsymbol{V}}$ In the modern game, any bid but $2 \boldsymbol{4}$ shows a full opener. Bid $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ and see if partner is willing to go past $2 \boldsymbol{4}$.
 are several others where either $4 \vee$ or 4 , will make). In short, I am too strong to give up on game. My $2 \checkmark$ bid promises a full opener and asks partner to evaluate their hand based on my rebid.

Joe Muenks 49 I'm going to make the aggressive jump to game denying any further information for the opponents.

Bob Fisk 2V Natural. 2 would be asking partner to further describe their hand, but that won't help me if partner shows a 3-card limit raise and no shortness. Better to describe and let partner decide (as risky as that sounds, since your partner probably thought 2C was natural....eek).

Steve Moese 25 Happy to show partner secondary hearts. If partner stays low, we stay out of game. Help in hearts makes all the difference.

Mike Ma $\underline{\mathbf{2 v}}$ With 6 loser hand you bid game opposite a LR. But this hand is an example of 5422 hands need to add one loser (courtesy of Mel Colchamiro). With 7 losers, you should invite. Hopefully you are not playing a system where over 2\&, any bid other than $2 \vee$ is GF. What you bid here depends on your game try scheme. $2 \vee$ either as LSGT or HSGT would work here.

Bob Jones 1NT We love to raise on three-card support, but not with three small in a balanced hand. Bid 1NT.

Steve Vogel 1NT I would not strongly consider any other rebid with this hand, especially with an honor in my short suit.

Joe Muenks 24 I like my ruffing value and do not like Jx if I bid 1NT (which I would do playing pure Standard American). Partner can ask about my spade length and strength of they wish. If minimum, partner can find 8 tricks usually.

Bob Fisk 1NT I would have opened 1NT if we were playing a weak 1NT (12-14), so I do the same thing now. If partner has a fifth spade, partner is going to correct 1 NT to $2 \boldsymbol{\alpha}$ or use $X Y Z$ to continue the auction.

Steve Moese 1NT With Jx in our doubleton there is no rush to raise on three cards. See this post by Steve Weinstein https://bridgewinners.com/article/view/1m-1m-now-what/

Mike Ma 1NT I follow Steve Weinstein who raises with 3 with a doubleton < Tx, but otherwise rebids 1NT

Bob Jones 2 Bidding 4a now shows a different, weaker, hand. You will get there eventually but start with 2 .

Steve Vogel 3 The key question with this hand is whether you view it as invitational or game forcing in spades. I view it as game forcing, given the fifth spade. My partners and I play a modified Bergen and Jacoby 2NT where I would need to bid 3 with this hand to make sure we reach game without my showing a stronger hand than I have.

Joe Muenks 2NT Time to pull out a game forcing spade raise. If partner shows a singleton diamond and has just a little extra, you might find a low HCP slam, if partner bids anything else over 2NT bid 4 next.

Bob Fisk 3ergen, showing a 4+ card constructive raise. If partner attempts to sign off in 3A, I'll bid game showing either 5+ spades or shortness somewhere and a maximum constructive raise. I play $3 *$ over 1 M as showing 10-15 HCP and $4+$ card support. Partner can ask for more information about my hand with $3 \geqslant$ (artificial), and I can bid 3 M with $4+$ card support and no shortness. Problem with that is this hand wants to be in game opposite any opener. I could bid 3NT over 3 to show 13-15 HCP, but that's not what I have. Better to go the 3 route (so there).

Steve Moese 2NT This hand is worth a force to game. 2NT helps us learn about possible slam potential. The Italians realized that with a fit, a small slam needs 10 controls (where a ace is 2 and king is 1 ). We have 5 and a 6 loser hand (Modern Losing Trick Count, please). Partner might have a long red suit or a useful singleton/void. Let's find out. Jumping to 4 or making a Bergen Limit Raise then bidding 4 closes out room for slam exploration. Imagine Kxxxx AQJxx $K x x$, or Kxxxx Axxx x KQxx opposite. Both are minimum opening hands and slam is odds on.

Mike Ma 2NT Jacoby 2NT. 7 loser is good for game. But in fact it is 6 because with 10 card fit, you can deduct one loser from the trumps. Not to mention 2 aces and 1 king (even if not in same suit) and two working doubletons. The aforementioned rule of adding one loser to 5422 hand does not apply when your side has so many trumps.

Question 5


Bob Jones 3e It's a little pushy, but you can't sell out at the two level. Bid 3e.
Steve Vogel Pass I have a minimum hand (even though it is a "maximum minimum," if there is such a thing). Given no fit for partner, I believe it is prudent to pass and await partner's action.

Joe Muenks Pass Sometimes we want to bid soooooooo bad. This is one of those cases, but we have great spade defense and partner can still come in. 2NT should show extras, 3\& should show at least 9 minor cards, usually 10, just go quietly into the night (unless it's a day game, you'll go quietly into the day).

Bob Fisk $\underline{X}$ Good hand without heart support. Partner can bid their longer minor, bid 2NT with equal-length minors to scramble, pass if appropriate, or bid $3 \vee$ with extra length in hearts (picture x KQJxxx Qxx xxx).

Steve Moese Pass This shows a minimum balanced hand without 4 heart cards. Since partner needs only 6 HCP to double here, we cannot quite guarantee the balance of power that's what a double here says. Besides, partner has one more call coming. Double is a bit aggressive, and is my second choice.

Mike Ma Pass What else? If your partner has 10+, she will make another bid.

Bob Jones $\underline{X} \quad$ This is likely your only chance to compete. Make a negative double.
Steve Vogel $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ With 5 hearts and 7 points, this hand qualifies for a negative double showing $4+$ hearts and $6+$ points. A $2 \vee$ response would promise 5 hearts and $10+$ points.

Joe Muenks $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ I'll throw in a negative double here. I'll probably just stay out of the auction from here on out but maybe partner will have 4 hearts with me.

Bob Fisk $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ What else? $2 \downarrow$ would show $5+$ hearts and 10+ HCP (Five-and-Dime). I suppose you could psych 6C, but that seems self-defeating.

Steve Moese $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ Showing at least 4 hearts and at least 6 HCP . Done.
Mike Ma $\quad$ X Little can go wrong if you X. If partner bids hearts, great! If she rebids $2 \uparrow$, you bid $2 \diamond$, and if $2 \forall$, pass. . In my system, $1 \geqslant=4+$ unless $4=4=3=2$, which is very unlikely with my hearet and the spade overcall. If partner rebids 1 NT , I will pass, and hope we did not miss a 5-3 heart fit.
