Bob Jones 1NT Forcing no trumpers will bid 1NT，but what about standard players？Do you really want to bid $2 \diamond$ on a 4 －card suit？You might never stop this train．Bid 1NT．

Steve Vogel 1NT（Forcing）The vast majority of 11 HCP hands start with a response of 1NT to a 14 opening bid．My next bid will depend upon partner＇s rebid，but I will definitely make another bid if partner＇s rebid is below game．

Joe Muenks 1NT Bid 1NT forcing one round and await developments．If 1NT is not forcing for you，bid 2 to show $10+$ and 4 card suits up the line．

Bob Fisk 1NT（Forcing）．This is why we play 1NT forcing in 2／1．And yes，I mean this exact hand（I＇ve been waiting for it for soooooo long）．The better question is＂What＇s going to be my rebid？＂If partner bids 2ゅ，I＇ll bid 3ゆ（2－card limit raise）．If partner rebids $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ ，I＇ll raise to $3 \uparrow$（or bid game if partner bids $2 \uparrow$ with confidence）．If partner rebids $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ or $2 \diamond$ ，I＇ll bid 2NT to show my balanced 11 count．If partner rebids 2NT showing 18－19 HCP and 5－3－3－2 shape，I＇ll bid 3NT（duh）．Bridge is easy！

Steve Moese 1NT The only answer playing 2／1 GF whether 1NT is forcing or semi forcing． Playing Standard American we need to bid $2 \diamond$ to show $10+$ values．

Mike Ma $\quad$ 1NT No option playing $2 / 1+$ Jacoby $2 N T$ ．As often with the Goren quiz，the issue is what next．Partner bids $2 \triangleleft(3+)$ to your forcing NT，do you rebid 2 $\downarrow$ or 2NT．Personally no matter what I do，it will turn out wrong．

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## Question 2

Q 2 - North-South vulnerable

Bob Jones 1 Open $1 \downarrow$. You might have an awkward rebid after a 1 NT or $2 \boldsymbol{1}$ response, but you would be happy after $1^{\boxed{V}}$ or 14 .

Steve Vogel 1 I tend not to open 11-point balanced hands, but this unbalanced hand, with support for both majors and all my high cards in my long suits, easily qualifies for an opening bid in my book.

Joe Muenks 1 This hand passes the rule of $20 / 22$, so we open it. Also we have a simple rebid, raising a major, probably.

Bob Fisk Pass I have zero reason to open this hand in first seat. For those who do, I'll ask them "Do you ever have a Drury bid?" I imagine not, since you seem to open any holding with 13 cards. Here, after Pass-(Pass), partner will open 1M, and I have an exquisite Drury response. Partner will (of course) pass my $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ bid, since partner always forgets Drury. Sigh.

Steve Moese 1 Some hands are made for a light opening bid and this is one. We have no rebid problems and can support either major. On a close decision to open, I check to see if the hand is 7 losers or better. This one is. Rule of 22 says $11+9+1.5+0.5=22$. So open the bidding already.

Mike Ma 1 Another Joe sighting a la Rule of 20/22. I take my PKJ and $A Q$ to satisfy the 2 of 22. Small club singleton, decent diamond suit, what are you waiting for to open?

Question 3
Q 3 - East-West vulnerable
\&KQ $8 \vee$ K 75 KJT 3 \& T 3

Bob Jones 3NT At this vulnerability, just bid 3NT. They are unlikely to bid over that.
Steve Vogel 3- Not the easiest hand to bid given the Michaels cue bid. My top choices are $2 \boldsymbol{L}$ (unusual over unusual showing limit+ support for diamonds), 3NT (2NT is non-forcing), passing awaiting future developments, or $3^{\top}$ asking partner to bid 3 NT with a heart stopper. A double in this auction shows a willingness to penalize the opponents, which I do not feel is right with only 3 cards in each major. I like 3 best because I would not want to be in 3NT with only one heart stopper.

Joe Muenks $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ We announce to partner that we can penalize those frisky opponents for a fine score depending on how things proceed. Note partner will likely be on lead through East when she leads a trump, since West will try to score a trump in the West hand but we'll try to prevent it.

Bob Fisk $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ We're hoping to take the opponents down two tricks doubled in $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ or 24 for +500 . That's better than any non-slam hand we can get on our own. Sweet! If partner flinches and rebids 3 , we'll be in 3NT or 5 probably making on a finesse (picture partner with xx J AQxxxx AJxx).

Steve Moese 3NT What I would have bid had East not bid. Double is an option, but we must take 7 tricks on defense to make up for our game. That seems a tall order given East's bid. I like South's hand declaring the NT game with both majors protected against the lead. If partner has 55+ minors, they'll run and we will get to our game in a minor. (Partner knows my $3 N T$ response tends to deny as much as Hxxx in either major - I double with that holding).

Mike Ma $\underline{X} \quad$ This one is tough. I can bid 2 (LR+ playing Unusual over unusual. I can blast out 3NT. Or I can X. Balanced hand suggests NT, but if partner has $\geqslant$ Qx, NT is better played on her side. But how can we achieve that? If $I X, I$ should be willing to defend. $2 \mathrm{M} X$ has two ways to win. They go down more than our game, or we go down in game. But we need to be sure they will go down.

Bob Jones 24 You might open 14 in $1^{\text {st }}$ or $2^{\text {nd }}$ seat, but partner is a passed hand. Open 24.

Steve Vogel 2昷 I prefer $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ to a $3^{\text {rd }}$ seat $1 \boldsymbol{A}$ bid for the preemptive value of opening $2 \boldsymbol{A}$.
Joe Muenks 24 This is really a close call because 2.5 defensive tricks in a preempt hand is a lot. However, keeping them from bidding hearts and pushing us up 1 too high is a consideration. After 2 partner is well positioned for his bids.

Bob Fisk 24 You're allowed to have a good hand/suit when you open 2 M vulnerable in third seat. If you open 14 light, you leave West too much room to compete in hearts (stupid West).

Steve Moese 14 The question posed is whether we should open 1中 or $2 \boldsymbol{4}$ (pass is not a serious consideration). Opposite the right invitational raise this hand can make game (few values in the majors, or shortness in diamonds). So I choose to avoid the $2 \boldsymbol{4}$ start.

Mike Ma 24 This is between 14 and 24. On average, the two PH have 8 hcp each. So opps are unlikely to have game, not to mention you have $21 / 2$ defensive tricks. In a partial contest, going down 2 vul for -200 even if undoubled will be a bad score. Bid 24 now and get it out of your system. If they bid $3 \vee$, defend.

Q 5 - North-South vulnerable

Bob Jones 1 When opening one of a minor with 4 cards in each suit, we believe you should always open $1 \star$. Bid $1 \star$.

Steve Vogel $1 \underset{\sim}{1 \rho}$ I won't open every 12 HCP hand, but in a close call, I will open this one (the $\boldsymbol{T}$ made me do it). Normally, I would open 1 with 4 diamonds and 4 clubs, but if the opponents win the auction, I want partner to lead a club and not a diamond.

Joe Muenks 1 Not only does this pass the rule of 20/22, the whole field except a few shy souls are opening it so you have to act like a lemming and jump over the cliff.

Bob Fisk 1 I'm not a member of the "Open your better minor" club (dues were too high). My rebid is going to be 1NT no matter what partner responds. That's a lie, of course, since my 1 NT rebid will be insufficient over some of partner's responses. Sue me.

Steve Moese 19 Don't overthink this one. Also meets the rule of 22: $12+8+0.5+0.5+1$
Mike Ma 19 Modern style is to frequently upgrade, never downgrade You have opening HCP, albeit an aceless wonder. But other than that, you have a pretty good hand, only 2 quacks, and one of them ( e Q ) in very good position. Open and make your life easier.

Bob Jones 4V You have to give partner some room to bid aggressively over competition by the opponents, so it's close between pass and $4 \uparrow$. We like 4 .

Steve Vogel 4V Is partner's 3 bid competitive or showing extras? It could be either (with no prior discussion), but given my great major suit cards, I can do no less than bidding $4 \boldsymbol{\Psi}$.

Joe Muenks Pass I think East has long hearts here. My 10 is square and the J» likely useless. My xxx in clubs is the worst possible holding. West is vulnerable so in an open game, they are often sane and not completely broke. For these reasons, I'm taking the low road.

Bob Fisk 4V Why is this question in here? Partner has shown a very nice hand with $6+$ hearts and fewer than three spades, and I have a 10 count with honor doubleton. Picture partner with $K \times$ AKxxxx AQx xx (making five on a club lead if the $\bigvee_{J}$ falls or six if East leads their stiff diamond). If you have a partner that bids $3 \bigvee$ with less on this auction, get a new partner (or explain to your partner that they don't have to overbid, since they have you to invite them back in the auction).

Steve Moese 4V We've got 9 working points to go along with partners 15-17, and the spade finesse seems likely to work. They still give Game bonuses for bidding and making game. Make an old-fashioned game try. Bid game and let partner try to make it!
