Bob Jones 2 Partner is a passed hand, so the opponents have you outgunned. Still, you have to take responsibility for your values. Bid $2 \boldsymbol{1}$

Steve Vogel 2 Would I like better spades for this bid? Yes, of course. But I do have support and enough to make a non-vulnerable raise even for a partner who originally passed. I do not like letting the opponents play at the 2 -level when both sides have a fit.

Joe Muenks 2上 I'm looking for the question??? Seems less than 10 in support with 3 trump, so.....

Bob Fisk Pass Idon't want partner leading away from KJTxx in spades. This is a partscore hand, and the opponents have 21+ HCP. Let's try and hold them to +110 .

Steve Moese 2 $\mathbf{2 4}$ Fit first. We have a simple raise. So we bid accordingly.
Mike Ma 2上 It is a live auction, and partner is a passed hand, so opps have the balance of points. Your spades suck for a free bd, and you would hate for partner to lead one on defense without a honor sequence. But the danger of $2 \star$ all pass is not something you can afford. You should be safe at 2 with a 8 -card fit. If partner took a chance and bid 14 with a 4 card suit, so be it. The chance of either opp having 4 spades is not big, and then they still have to figure out how to $X$.

## Question 2

Q 2 - North-South vulnerable

Bob Jones 3NT West, behind you, is advertising spades and diamonds. Protect your holdings in those suits by becoming declarer. Bid 3NT.

Steve Vogel 3- Partner's 2 free bid shows 6+ hearts and I have decent support as well as extras. My $3 \vee$ bid shows $2+$ hearts and willingness to investigate slam. I am not overly put off by West's double, which could merely suggest an interest in sacrificing over vulnerable opponents.

Joe Muenks 3Y Partner doesn't have to bid over the double so must have 6 hearts but the strength is undefined. Our $3 \boldsymbol{V}$ is stronger than $4 \bigvee$ would be. For slam we need partner to have at least a Q in each of West's suits, but that is not too much to ask.

Bob Fisk 2NT We're in a game force, and my LHO just announced length and possible length in the pointy suits. I'd rather be in $3 N T$ with the lead coming to me. Picture partner with xx AQJxxx xx Kxx and West with AQJxx x AQxxx xx. I make 5NT but only 4Y.

Steve Moese 3if We are in a game force. The choice we have here is between a 3 NTstrength show ( $15-17$, no fast arrival in NT), $3 \bigvee$ (but some play the $2 \bigvee$ rebid doesn't show $6+$ ), or 3 to show our 6 -card suit. (Note 2 NT here is only invitational). I like 3 to describe our shape (strain before game), 3 NT will likely kill the auction. $3 \boldsymbol{y}$ might not get us to the best place (if partner fits clubs and has $6+$ hearts we might have slam in either round suit).

Mike Ma $\quad 3$ No matter how you play $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ if West passes, here $2 \bigvee 100 \%$ promises $6+$ hearts, and the suit should be at least decent, which your $K T$ will make into at least good, say at most one loser assuming normal break I am giving up on NT and bidding $3 \boldsymbol{Y}$ to allow probing slam. Bidding 3is to show your club suit can create problem if partner bids anything but $3 \boldsymbol{}$ over it.

Bob Jones 34 It's a bit dangerous, but you can't sell out to $3 \downarrow$. Bid 3 A.
Steve Vogel $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ Partner had ways to show a decent hand (3e showing $5+$ hearts and $10+$ points or 3 showing spade support and $10+$ points) as well as a light to moderate hand with hearts (by bidding 3V) or a constructive raise in spades. Given the vulnerability, however, I am willing to go out on a limb with a takeout double and hope for the best.

Joe Muenks 3- It's a bidders game. Partner did not indicate any help, so maybe you are the one sacrificing but maybe they'll bid 4 and after you lead your singleton trump, maybe they fall short a trick.

Bob Fisk $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ This is clearly takeout, and I want partner bidding 3@ with $\mathrm{Qx} x \mathrm{xxx} x \mathrm{xxx}$ xxx. On a good day, we go down only one.

Steve Moese X We have 16 HCP and six nice spades plus support for hearts (and clubs, but they don't matter here). Partners pass is telling. They can make an invite or force by bidding 3 of either minor (Called unusual over unusual), they can make a constructive 7-9 HCP raise of spades or a constructive 7-9 HCP $3 \downarrow$ bid immediately over 2 NT , and they can double to show Hxxx or better (and invitational plus values) in either minor. None of that happened. If we pass and partner has a weak raise, they might pass. If we pass and partner doesn't fit spades we might be handing the opponents a cheap 3 -level contract. If we bid spades we might miss our heart fit. We don't want that.
Net with partner 0-6 opposite, double is the most flexible way to compete. We like competing on this hand.

Mike Ma 39 Partner did not X 2NT. Playing Unusual over Unusual, she could bid 3P for NF hearts. I have a good hand, but not so good that 3 is an underbid. Knowing I have a spade suit good enough to bid 3 in direct position will let partner know what to do if they bid more diamonds.

Bob Jones 3NT This hand is not worth a slam move unless you have a heart fit. Bid 3NT. Partner will let you know if he has a good hand for hearts.

Steve Vogel 3NT If partner shows a heart fit by correcting to 4 $\mathbf{~}$, I will check for key cards before bidding slam. Without a heart fit, I am fine with stopping in 3NT (although we will sometimes miss a slam).

Joe Muenks 4NT This is a quantitative NT raise. If partner has hearts they now count distributional points to consider slam. Discuss with your partner that is keycard in this sequence.

Bob Fisk 3NT If partner passes, we're in the right contract. If partner bids 4母, I'll bid 4 (Kickback) to ask for keycards. 6 NT often requires 33 HCP , but $6 \vee$ requires much less. Picture partner with KJxx KQJ KQx Axx. Yep, that'll work.

Steve Moese 3NT Unfortunately we might have a thin slam on these cards. A quantitative 4NT won't get us the info we need. 3d shows more spades than we have and 4 is likely a splinter showing slam ambitions and $6+$ hearts.
Now if partner adjusts to $4 \boldsymbol{\zeta}$ showing a fit, we can express interest by bidding 4@ (4NT for you kickback enthusiasts). Now partner can decide.

Mike Ma 3NT Without a heart fit, this hand is very so-so opposite 20-21. So just bid 3NT now. If partner has hearts, she would bid 4 or cue with better hand that could not super accept before. If opener cues 4e, I will go along and cue 4@ (or 4NT cue for spades if playing kickback).

Bob Jones 2人 This hand is well worth an invitational raise. Bid $2 \boldsymbol{A}$.
Steve Vogel 24 I have enough for a cue bid showing a limit+ raise and 4+ hearts.
Joe Muenks 2a 3 or more trump, 10 or more playing points, so....
Bob Fisk 24 Cuebid the opponent's suit to show a $3+$ card limit+ raise for partner. Note those sneaky plus signs. Here you have extra trump and extra HCP. Yay you. Don't bid $4 \bigvee$, since that's a preemptive bid (i.e., you'd bid 4 Y holding xx xxxxx Qx xxxx).

Steve Moese 24 I'll venture an aggressive invite on these cards. We have 3 cover cards and partner has advertised 7 losers. If partner is one trick better than that we should have a good chance for game. A 6-loser hand accepts an invite.

Mike $\mathrm{Ma} \quad \underline{\text { 2A }} \quad 3 \mathrm{~K}$ and 5 trumps $=\mathrm{LR}$.

Bob Jones 4 Partner wants to play in $4 \sqrt{7}$ if you have three hearts. Follow his lead. Bid 4

Steve Vogel 4- I would assume that the original 1NT is a weak notrump bid, as this hand does not meet my requirements for a strong 1NT bid. Despite my 4-3-3-3 distribution, 1 would correct to $4 \mathbf{V}$, because if partner has a doubleton in a minor suit, we will often make more tricks in hearts.

Joe Muenks 4- Because you are square doesn't mean partner is. BTW if you play 14+17 NT, I STILL wouldn't open this yucky 14 1NT.

Bob Fisk N/A I wouldn't have opened 1NT with that sickly 14 HCP hand.
Steve Moese Pass Our 4333 shape means we are not getting extra tricks from the short trump hand (ours). Our side suit stoppers are well placed. 3NT should score well and on occasion will make when $4 \vee$ goes down.

Mike Ma 4- I used to torture myself with hands like this deciding between passing 3NT or bidding 4『, and when I am wrong, I would take it very badly. Now I just automatically bid $4 \Upsilon$ unless the hand says pass $100 \%$.
