Bob Jones Pass Four low spades would not keep us from pre-empting, but four good ones will. Pass.


Steve Vogel <u>Pass</u> Some play that anything goes for a 1st seat preempt, but that is not my approach. I have more points in my spade suit than my diamond suit, and I would choose to pass and await further developments.


Joe Muenks <u>Pass</u> I'm old-fashioned, with 4 prime cards in spades, in first seat, I'm not risking preempting our side out of our best contract.

Bob Fisk Pass Even if I played 2♦ as weak, I'd still pass. Partner holds AQxx xxx Kx Axxx, and we belong in 4♠.

Steve Moese <u>Pass</u> Some will make a weak two with any six-card suit. I prefer a disciplined approach in the first two seats. The 4-card spade suit disqualifies opening 2, and this hand is far from a 1, opening bid.

Mike Ma Pass I mentioned before that my dividing line to preempt first seat with a 4-card side major is if that suit is headed by the Q or less. If Q, then I examine other features like the texture of that suit. Anyway, KJT7 is not even close to that dividing line.





Bob Jones \underline{X} In the old days, a double here was for penalties. Modern players treat it as take-out, which is far more useful. Double.


Steve Vogel X There are a lot of options for how people play a double of a 2-level overcall of an opening strong 1NT bid, but I prefer it to be primarily for takeout.


Joe Muenks <u>Pass</u> This would be a great hand to play weak negative doubles at the 2 level in this auction like some experts do, but I play Lebensohl so there are no bids to make here.

Bob Fisk \underline{X} I play double as negative showing competitive values or better (i.e., 6+). I don't care what partner bids. Maybe partner has the same hand I showed for Question #1 plus the $\frac{1}{2}$ Q and we're on a finesse to make $\frac{1}{2}$ $\frac{1}{2}$. What fun!

Steve Moese 24 Nonforcing. Will LHO raise hearts? Will partner double? Let's find out.

Mike Ma Pass I play penalty X, so I have no choice here. With some partners, I do have well worked out method for opener to balance with 3♥. Occasionally opener will have 4 hearts and cannot reopen. C'est la vie.





Bob Jones <u>1NT</u> A 1NT bid here must be discussed with partner, but we like it as strong, 15-18. Bid 1NT.


Steve Vogel <u>1NT</u> These days, pairs are opening lighter and responding lighter. Accordingly, I prefer to play that a 1NT overcall in this auction is the normal 15-18 HCP. I like the overcall better than a takeout double as it more narrowly communicates my holding to partner, who is now in a better position to place the contract.


Joe Muenks <u>1NT</u> With half my partners I can overcall this as a natural NT. It would be really dangerous except that folks open so light nowadays we worry less about a big penalty. With half my partners I must pass and defend since a NT here shows a weak hand 5-5+ red.

Bob Fisk Pass How many points do you think partner has? If lefty has 12 and righty has eight (not unreasonable), partner has only three. I expect lefty to rebid 1NT, and I'd rather have them go down one in 1NT (+100) than have us possibly make 1NT (+90). It's much harder to make 1NT with 17 opposite 3 than it is to make 1NT with 12 opposite 8. Look it up on Wikipedia if you don't believe me.

Steve Moese <u>1NT</u> Natural and not Sandwich for me. Yes, they have about 18 HCP. Let them find their fit. The first to 1NT often wins.

Mike Ma <u>1NT</u> I play natural NT here, which is really preferable in these days of ultralight opening AND response. Simple Bridge is best.





Bob Jones <u>Pass</u> A negative double would not be terrible, but we prefer to make a trap pass, hoping partner will re-open with double, which we will then pass. Pass.


Steve Vogel Pass Vulnerable with a void in partner's suit, I would choose to more cautious and pass at this point. Other alternatives are to bid 2NT, 3♦ or double, and each of those has its merits. Of those three, my second choice is a negative double, where I would convert a 3♣ bid by partner to 3♦. My greatest concern is that partner will rebid spades.


Joe Muenks \underline{X} Whereas you could pass and pull partner's mandatory double to $3 \diamondsuit$, that should be a weaker hand, so we'll lie a little about our minor suit lengths with a negative double. Partner will not bid a simple $3 \diamondsuit$ or $3 \diamondsuit$ with extras.

Bob Fisk \underline{X} Bidding $3 \diamondsuit$ now feels a tad aggressive (do I really want partner to rebid $4 \spadesuit$?). I'll double and bid $3 \diamondsuit$ over $2 \spadesuit$ to show a long diamond suit, no spade tolerance, and invitational values. If partner bids $3 \heartsuit$ over $3 \diamondsuit$, I'll bid 3NT. Bridge is easy!

Steve Moese **Pass** The spade void puts me off a negative double.

Mike Ma Pass Not good enough to bid 3♦. 2NT is awful. I can X and correct opener's 2♠ or 3♠ to 3♦, but I can't know if that is right, and if partner bids 4♠? !!!. Over partner's expected reopening X of my pass, maybe I'll try 3NT. If partner does not reopen, maybe defending 2♥ is right. If advancer raise, I hope to be able to double 3♥.





Bob Jones 3♠ Bid 3♠, showing 4-card support and, at this vulnerability, 5-7 points.

Steve Vogel 2♠ We are vulnerable, the value of my ♥K is dubious, and I have no shortness. Another hand where I would be cautious and avoid a preemptive jump to 3♠.

Joe Muenks $\underline{2} \bullet$ With a poorly placed K \checkmark , even with 4 trump I'd tread lightly since the opponents haven't found a fit and might not.

Bob Fisk $3 \triangleq$ Don't shy away from the correct bid because of the vulnerability. If the opponents want to play in $4 \triangleq$, let em.

Steve Moese 2 DON'T jump to 3 at unfavorable vulnerability when the K♥ might not be working and you have no values in the minors (what RHO's double shows). Nope.

Mike Ma <u>3♠</u> Hard to see how this can be our hand. Put the pressure on in spite of the ♥Kx. It is difficult for them to X us when we have 9 spades, and my QJ make the suit decent no matter what partner's spades are.



Bob Jones $\underline{5}$ A big spade raise is sure to be coming from East. You will have to bid this later anyway, so do it now. Bid 5.

Steve Vogel 3.2 My plan when I opened this hand was to bid clubs at my next turn. The fact that the opponents have found a spade fit makes my hand even more offensively oriented. If we have a minor suit fit and partner has the \checkmark A, game is on the table.

Joe Muenks 3 This hand begs to be declarer, so I'll bid clubs now and possibly again to force partner to pick a minor.

Bob Fisk 3♣ Partner's double didn't promise clubs, but you were always going to get both of your suits in the auction, weren't you? Picture partner with xxx xxxx Kx Qxxx, and you have a great sacrifice in 5♣ over 4♠ (down one doubled). Sweet!

Steve Moese 3 6-5 come alive" Warn partner off hearts and show them 10 of your 11 minor suit cards.

Mike Ma 5 Partner may not have clubs, and may have the worst hand for us, something like 4=6=1=2, not enough to bid 2 But no reason to count on the worst. Put the pressure on with favorable vul. Let opps make the last guess.
