Bob Jones 3 2\% is not available for a pre-empt, so 3 allows for pre-empts with good 6 -card suits. Bid 3\%.

Steve Vogel 3\% A very good 6-card club suit, along with relative shortness in the majorsperfect for a 3 opening in 1st, 2nd or 3rd seat.

Joe Muenks Pass On some days I might preempt but with no singleton in first seat I'll pass this round. Obviously, in 3rd seat you'll open 3e.

Bob Fisk Pass If I open 3 in first seat, I'll have seven clubs. If you put a gun one and tell me I can't pass the above hand, well then l'll call the police and report you for pointing a gun at me. Enjoy your time in prison.

Steve Moese 3@ The most annoying and effective preempt according to Larry Cohens article on the million hands analysis. With a good 6-card suit, go for pressure.

Mike Ma $\quad$ 39 Negatives for preempting. Only 6 clubs, but very respectable suit. Only 5 tricks (so off one by Rule of 2-3-4), but $\$$ JTx from partner will give us one more. Balanced hand. On the plus side, only 4 cards in majors. $3 \boldsymbol{*}$ is the most powerful preempt because they have to disentangle 3 suits, including both majors, and they will be very unlikely to $X$ you with so much space. I love preempting.

Bob Jones 2NT This hand is barely worth 2NT, but it is. Without the J\&, bid 2V.
Steve Vogel $\mathbf{2 \boldsymbol { V }}$ I have the strength for a 2NT bid, but I do not like the lack of stopper in spades. I have no other reasonable alternative to show my strength. Others would not let the lack of spade stopper deter them, but I would lean towards a $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ rebid. We might occasionally miss a game, but I believe we will more often land in a better spot.

Joe Muenks 2NT The $\boldsymbol{\Phi}$ T and 9 might be helpful as we confidently bid 2NT showing 10+ to 12 - since the 5 -card suit might be gold and the $\downarrow K$ seems to fit, so this is no minimum.

Bob Fisk $\quad \underline{\mathbf{2 v}}$ You'll have this situation at least twice per session where you have to take a "false preference" back to partner's major holding a doubleton. It's easy to do it when you hold only three cards in partner's second suit, but it's no less correct if you have 4-card support (or occasionally five).

Steve Moese 2NT Invite game with a balanced 11 HCP. For many, $3 \boldsymbol{2}$ here would show a 6 -card suit. Depending on how you play 1 - 3\%, bidding $3 \boldsymbol{2}$ now (don't do it) might be ambiguous as to strength. $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ a decided underbid.

Mike Ma 2NT The good club suit encourages me to not just meekly sign off in $2 \boldsymbol{V}$. I am not worried about spades. They have had chances to bid it and have not. Plus, I even have sT9x.

Bob Jones Pass $1 \%$ or $1 \geqslant$ Why wrestle with that choice when this hand is not really worth an opening bid, especially with rebid problems. Pass.

Steve Vogel Pass This is a close one, only because of favorable vulnerability. I like to open unbalanced minimum hands not vulnerable, but this hand has several flaws. If I open my longest suit with 1e, what will I rebid over 14? If I, instead, open 1 with the plan to rebid $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ over a 14 response, partner will misread the length of my 2 suits. Given a minimum hand with flawed opening bid options, I would choose to pass.

Joe Muenks 1 First, this passes 20/22 so we'll open. Next, I'm one of those "open 1 and rebid 2 " guys since this shows 8 of my cards and I do not rebid 1NT with a singleton. This is how you avoid doing so when partner makes the expected 14 response.

Bob Fisk Pass Ick.
Steve Moese Pass A marginal opening bid in 2/1, but a clear opener if partner expects something this weak.

Mike Ma Pass When you consider opening light, it is even more important than usual to consider your rebid. What if partner responds spades? Opening 1 and rebidding $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ with $4=5$ is no longer recommended, possibly resulting in you playing in 4-2 fit. But opening $1 \%$ and rebidding 2 is vomit inducing with this club suit. Rebidding $1 N T$ is bad enough with a singleton in partner's suit, but worse when you don't have full opening values. You should not have trouble coming in if you pass now.

Steve Vogel 19 Yes, I know this hand has potentially wasted values in a singleton Queen and a doubleton Jack. Still, a 1 opening shows where my strength lies, and I have an easy rebid of 14 over a red suit response or $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ over a 1 NT response. Besides, if you pass, what will you bid if partner opens 1 ? You cannot bid 2 (Drury), so you are forced to respond an ugly 1NT (or even worse, 3\&).

Joe Muenks 1\% This easily passes the 20/22 criteria and has no rebid concerns.

Bob Fisk $\quad$ 1e l'll bid $2 \boldsymbol{L}$ if partner responds 14 and $2 \boldsymbol{e}$ over any other response. I know some wise-acre will ask "Are you really going to rebid $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ after your partner responds 2NT?" Of course I am-I'm a man of my word.

Steve Moese Pass Another marginal opening hand. The red suit values are all but worthless.

Mike Ma 19 Not passing with this club suit and 4 spades, and satisfying Joe's Rule of $20 / 22$. Certainly not preempting $3 \boldsymbol{2}$ vul with 6 card suit when I can open 1.

Note: a 3 V rebid here is a splinter raise of spades, not a weak $5=6$ hand. Rebidding 2 understates and loses the hearts.

Mike Ma 20 If you open $1 \boldsymbol{\text { ins }}$ instead of 1 (basically what everyone would do), you have already decided you will rebid over 1 1 . I play that responder's 2 V now is NF , so if you are lucky, you may yet luck back into hearts.
