Question 1


Bob Jones 3 Partner＇s bid is forcing．Despite a minimum，you should not bid 34 after raising on 3 －card support．Bid $3^{\star}$ instead．

Steve Vogel 39 My partners and I have other ways to find out if partner＇s spade support is 3 or 4 cards and whether partner is minimum or maximum（Spiral or Wold 2NT）．Accordingly， I would take partner＇s 3 bid as a slam try．Although I am minimum，I have 3 Aces，so I will not jump to game，but will bid 34，allowing partner to make the next move．

Joe Muenks 3 Spades is trump，so other bids are forward－going．Partner has club shortness as control，or many would play she has the king．Though 12 HCP feels like a minimum， aces are exactly what slams require．Cue bid back your control and await developments．

Bob Fisk N／A I would have bid 1NT over 14，and I play Spiral，so 3e on this auction doesn＇t even exist（i．e．，partner would bid 2NT to check to see if I had three or four spades and whether I had a minimum or maximum hand given the auction）． $3 \%$ is definitely forcing on the auction shown above，but I don＇t really have a reasonable response to it．Sigh．

Steve Moese Pass Partner says they have 4 spades and an invite．We are happy to play in clubs at the 3 level．We use 2NT for invites（spiral or Wold）．

Mike Ma 3 In general，we do not try to＂improve＂a partial from 2 M to 3 m even if the M fit may only be Moysian，so I take $3 \boldsymbol{2}$ as forcing and at least inviting． C was my opening bid，so partner＇s bid should be showing values there．If partner wants to know if I have 3 or 4 S ， she would have bid Spiral，so she should have 5＋S．I am＂accepting＂the invite of course．En route I am giving her a＂courtesy＂cue of $3 \downarrow$ ．Hopefully we are on the same page．：－）

Bob Jones $\underline{\mathbf{2 N}}$ Start with $2 \boldsymbol{2}$. Should partner bid the dreaded $2 \vee$, your agreed methods will dictate whether you should pass or bid $2 \vee$.

Steve Vogel 2 My plan is to settle in 2 of a major suit. If partner rebids $2 \downarrow$, I will rebid $2 \boldsymbol{2}$, which asks partner to pass or correct to $2 \boldsymbol{4}$.

Joe Muenks 2 One way to play a weak 5-5 is to guess a suit and transfer into it. Some other ways might get you to the 3 level. I like to play that $1 N T-2 \boldsymbol{2}-2 \boldsymbol{l}$ shows a weak hand with 5 hearts and 4 or 5 spades, partner will pass or correct to 24 with 3 spades and 2 hearts.

Bob Fisk $\quad \underline{2 \rho}$ I'll pass partner's $2 \vee$ or $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ bid, and I'll "crawl" up to $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ if partner bids $2 \downarrow$. Playing Crawling Stayman, partner will correct $2 \vee$ to $2 \boldsymbol{\text { with }}$ a doubleton heart. Good job, me!

Steve Moese 2 Time to trot out Crawling Stayman. We will pass either Major response, and bid $2 \vee$ over partner's $2 \vee$. Partner will correct to their 3 -card Major. If partner is $2=2=(45)$, we'll play in a 7 -card fit of partner's choosing at the 2 -level.

Mike Ma 2 Every partnership should have agreement on how to bid various hands with both M in response to 1 NT . I have a hand I want to play in 2 M . I begin with $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ and pass 2 M reply. If partner bids $2 \triangleleft$, I bid $2 \downarrow$, which is drop dead with $44 \mathrm{M}, 4=5$, or 55 , but never $5=4$. Partner passes unless $3=2 \mathrm{M}$, where she will correct to $2 \boldsymbol{4}$, and will be quite happy when dummy comes down.

Bob Jones 34 Partner's bid carries the same meaning as always, even in competition.
Bid 3at to show a minimum.
Steve Vogel 3- My partners I play that a redouble in this auction is the OGUST ask, and that 2 NT is Lebensohl, asking opener to bid 3 . I would guess that most do not play that way, so I will answer as if 2NT is the OGUST ask. I play that a good suit is 2 out of the top 3 honors or 3 out of the top 5 (including the Ace or King). Accordingly, I would bid 3 showing good suit, bad hand (although I am close to a good hand).

Joe Muenks 3- This is an "ignore the double" auction. Partner has spade support and an invitational hand, so we answer that we have a good suit but minimal hand. Playing feature, I show the diamond card, purely coincidentally, since we have 9 playing points.

Bob Fisk 3- I believe the default interpretation of 2 NT when no explanation is given is "Hey, bid a feature, stupid!" I did.

Steve Moese 3-OGUST (good suit bad hand) If playing feature, I rebid 34. Too weak to show the $\Downarrow$ K.

Mike Ma N/A Can't answer without knowing what 2NT is.

Bob Jones Pass This is a minimum opening bid with potentially serious rebid problems. Why take on problems with a dead minimum? Pass.

Steve Vogel 10 Yes, I do not like my expected rebid issue if I open this hand, but with 2 Aces and a decent 5-card suit, I would choose to open 1\%.

Joe Muenks 1 We pass the rule of 20/22, so we'll open. I'm one of the folks who open 1 and rebid 2 with these kinds of hands. The opponents are likely to be bidding a buncha spades, so we'll try to get both minors mentioned hoping partner matches one of them.

Bob Fisk Pass Where do I start? I have only 11 HCP , I have a stiff A which will gobble up the two and three from the opponents, I have no rebid when I open 1\% and partner bids 19, I'm not about to open $1 \diamond(\mathrm{Jxxx})$ and rebid $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ (AQxxx) and play in 2 opposite 753 when partner also has Kxx of clubs. Need I go on? I need not.

Steve Moese 19 Exceeds the Rule of 20 (or 22) so we open. If partner responds 1 we raise hearts. If partner responds 14, we rebid $2 \boldsymbol{i}$. (Do NOT rebid 2 - that's a reverse showing $16 / 17+$ HCP).

Mike Ma 10 Always nice to see a Rule of 20/22 hand for Joe. The one drawback of this hand is the M holding. It used to be said that when you open, you make it easier for them to come in (with the M in this case). But nowadays we appreciate that if you open, bidding is much easier for your side and harder for them. You want to $C$ lead from partner if you end up defending don't you? If you pass, and it goes (1M) - P - (2M) - ? How would you feel?

Bob Jones 1NT Even after the overcall, you still need 10 points to bid 2\%. You have enough to bid, however, and you have a likely heart stopper. Bid 1NT.

Steve Vogel Pass I view that my best alternative to a pass is 1 NT . I do not like bidding notrump with an unbalanced hand, a tenuous stopper in the opponent's suit and a nearminimum hand. I also do not like raising partner's suit to 2 with only 3 (especially vulnerable). Best to pass for now.

Joe Muenks 2 This looks like a fun hand since West is ready to bid spades. 2 now forces him up a level. Note that later in the auction we'll bid clubs, showing 6+ but still the 6-9 pt hand that 2 showed.

Bob Fisk 1NT I can't bid 2e--that shows $5+$ clubs and 10+ HCP, and passing is silly. 1NT it is!

Steve Moese Pass This hand has an Ace but a poor club suit, so a weak jump shift is out of the question.

Mike Ma 19 Another advertisement for playing $X=4+S$ and 1 $\mathbf{~}=3$ or less. You have the $P$, so if push comes to shove, you can bid 1NT. But your hand hardly looks like a NT hand. 14 should give your partner a good idea of your hand, 3 or less S, likely < $4 \mathrm{D}, \mathrm{H}$ not good for 1NT etc.

Bob Jones 2 Bid 2 if that is natural in your methods. Pass otherwise.
Steve Vogel 2V Partner has either 2 or 3 hearts. Given my shape, we will normally do better playing in hearts than notrump. With only 3 -card support in diamonds, I would choose the major over the minor.

Joe Muenks 2- Normally we want 6 hearts to rebid them, but when partner shows 2-3, it is ok to drop dead with 5 and a singleton or void since our hand will take 2-3 more tricks in hearts frequently if the opponents hold the $\vee A$ and prevent you from running them in NT.

Bob Fisk $\quad \underline{\mathbf{2 4}}$ If partner opened a weak notrump (12-14), I would have bid $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ asking for a 4-card major. Partner doesn't have one, so I would have crawled up to $2 \boldsymbol{V}$. All roads. By the way, this hand is why I always rebid a 4-card spade suit after $1 \mathrm{~m}-1 \mathbb{V}$. Nuff said.

Steve Moese 2- Would not fault a pass. Anything else is too rich for this hand. Partner will have 3 hearts often enough to make this rebid worthwhile. Partner might have rebid 14 with a good spade suit.

Mike Ma 2- There is no hand where opener will rebid 1NT with singleton H (compared to if you had replied 14, in which case it depends on your agreement if 1NT may have singleton $S$ ), so you are sure of at least 5-2 fit. This hand is an example of why it is NOT a good idea for opener to bypass 4 S and rebid 1NT with balanced hand.
