## Question 1

Q 1 - Nether vulnerable

Bob Jones 4-Bid 4», showing a distributional hand with no interest in a no trump contract.

Steve Vogel 4-My partners and I play that a jump bid in a new suit in response to 2NT shows a decent side 5 -card suit. If partner has the right hand, we might have slam in one of my suits.

Joe Muenks 3 When playing feature, consider this a max and show your diamonds. When playing Ogust it depends on your trump criteria, but this is a max with good trump in my world, so we'd bid 34.

Bob Fisk 4 When you open $2 x$ with 6-5 shape and partner asks for more information with 2NT, you'll rebid your second suit at the four level pretty much regardless of the methods you use (i.e., Ogust, Feature, other). 6-5 hands are as rare as hen's feet (I'm pretty sure that's the correct saying).

Steve Moese 3^ Assuming Ogust responses. However 3\$ playing Feature or 4 showing $6-5$ are acceptable here. $3 \%$ with the singleton $K$ is a misstatement. A singleton king is not a feature.

Mike Ma 4 To me, this hand is too good to open 24V 1st seat. I would have opened 14 (see the next question for comparison). I don't know what 2NT is over $2 \boldsymbol{4}$. I assume RONF, so forcing and natural, or maybe it is feature. 3NT is not helpful to partner even if right. 3 is an underbid (assume natural). I bid 4 to show my hand.

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## Question 2

Q 2 - North-South vulnerable

Bob Jones $\underline{\mathbf{2 V}}$ We like $2 \boldsymbol{2}$. It is OK to have a maximum once in a while.
Steve Vogel $2 \boldsymbol{2}$ This hand is right on the dividing line between $1 \checkmark$ and $2 V$ (and a pass given the decent spade support would not be unreasonable). In 1st position and vulnerable, given my limited defensive values, I would choose to open $2 \downarrow$, even at the risk of missing a spade fit.

Joe Muenks 25 You are allowed to have a max preempt from time to time. The rule of 20/22 helps decide between opening 1 or 2 , and here 2 is indicated. Just do not pass saying a hand is too strong to preempt (I've heard that so many times), it's either weak or a 1 opener, there's no space between.

Bob Fisk $\underline{\mathbf{2 4}}$ If I was 6-4, I'd open 1『. I'm not 6-4. So there. Playing GUS (Granovetter Unified System). I'd open $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ and then bid 3NT over partner's 2NT inquiry showing a good hand with exactly 3-6-3-1 shape (singleton low).

Steve Moese 1- This hand is just good enough for a 1 1 opening bid ( 7 losers and 2 quick tricks). My weak 2 bids are never this good.

Mike Ma $\underline{\mathbf{2 V}}$ I have always been adamant that if your suit quality and shape satisfies weak 2, there is no such thing as too good for 2 and not good enough for 1 . You open one or the other. Red vs white, I will open a maximum $2 \vee$. If I am white, I will open $1 \mathbb{V}$ even though it does not satisfy Joe's Rule of 20/22.

## Question 3

Q 3 - East-West vulnerable

Bob Jones Pass When partner pre-empts in your shortest suit, stay out of the auction unless you have a strong no trump or the equivalent. Pass.

Steve Vogel 39 Usually, I would not raise partner's 2 bid to 3 with fewer than 3-card support, but this hand might be an exception. At this vulnerability, and given the opponents very likely have a heart fit, there is good reason to make it harder for them to enter the auction. I have enough defensive values to feel that we have reasonable chance of beating $4 \boldsymbol{V}$ if they still choose to enter the auction.

Joe Muenks Pass Another 90\% concurrence I hope, since partner is odds on to make 24 and the opponents are unlikely to make anything their way, so you're going plus, woo hoo.

Bob Fisk Pass I'd certainly raise with three spades or with honor doubleton if I held Qx xx AKxxx JTxx, but that's not my hand. It's not clear that West will be coming into the auction, and I don't particularly mind if they do.

Steve Moese Pass I only see 7 tricks our way and perhaps only 6 (partner can be very aggressive at this vulnerability). I want raises to be based on total trumps (9) and not HCP even at this vulnerability. I have defense against the opponents' possible contracts. They now have to start looking for a fit at the 3-level. Pass and await developments. What we do not do here is pass then back in with 34. If we are going to raise, we do so immediately.

Mike Ma Pass I suppose the idea of this question is whether you use the NV vs V situation and further the preempt with 3 , or even bid 3 if your system allows you to do so, or psyche Ogust or some other shenanigan. However, partner has already stretched with her preempt exploiting the vulnerability, and will often have 5 trumps only, plus may be quite wide ranging. You have just enough that game by opps is not certain. Both partners stretching is a recipe for bad score unless you are lucky, which I am not.

## Question 4

Bob Jones $\underline{X} \quad$ Partner might have trap-passed and you're expected to re-open with double whenever that call seems reasonable. It's reasonable here. Double.

Steve Vogel $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ It is almost mandatory to reopen this hand with a double in case partner is making a trap pass. I would do so even if I had a minimum opener (which this hand is not). If partner is not making a trap pass, I have support for all unbid suits (although I'll have another decision of whether to return to spades if partner bids another suit).

Joe Muenks 24 Sure, I'll play along. Perhaps partner can now compete to 3 with the right hand and if not we'll defend $3 \vee$.

Bob Fisk 24 I almost always double if I open, my LHO overcalls, my partner and my RHO both pass, and I'm short in the overcaller's suit. Here, I have a self-sufficient spade suit, we're both vulnerable, and I have extras, so I'll rebid 2 $\mathbf{~ d}$. Picture partner with Tx xxxx Kxx Qxxx, making 34 most likely.

Steve Moese $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ We play negative doubles and this is a classic (if not stronger than average) reopening double hand. We strain to reopen with minimum values and 0-2 cards in their suit. Double is more flexible than a spade rebid and we would be happy to defend if partner made a penalty pass. We can rebid spades later. Besides, partner would make a negative double with $9+$ HCP, or 2NT with a stopper and 10-11 HCP (unless they want a penalty double).

Mike Ma $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ You have a good hand with good spade suit. With short hearts, you are not passing, so it is a question of bidding 3 人 or doubling. Your hand is not that distributional that you mind defending if partner has a trap pass. If I $X$, and partner bids 3 m or 2NT (pick a minor, some play Lebensohl here), I will bid 34, hoping partner will not take me for a stronger hand than I have compared to bidding $3 \boldsymbol{\$}$ directly.

## Question 5

Q 5 - North-South vulnerable

Bob Jones Pass We hate to sell out, but this hand is not quite strong enough to bid. It is close, though. Pass.

Steve Vogel $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ This is the kind of hand that tests your tolerance for risk. Making a double in the passout seat promises less strength than a direct double, but it is also riskier as preemptor's partner could have decent strength with a limited fit, and partner has already passed. Partner could also bid 4 H , which could go for a big number if partner's suit is not very strong. Still, passing with reasonable support for the unbid suits and a decent level of strength will often lead to a poor score. No guts, no glory, as they say.

Joe Muenks $\underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ With spade shortness (0 or 1) and knowing partner needs full or extra values to act in direct seat vulnerable you are almost obligated to double with 10 or more HCP and support for the other suits. We want 4 hearts but were not dealt them, rats. Partner is likely short in 1 suit but has long spades, so we're $95 \%+$ to match one of the other 2 suits.

Bob Fisk $\underline{\boldsymbol{X}} \quad$ I didn't pick up my hand to play in 3 $\mathbf{A}$. I might go for a number if partner is broke, but that's how Matchpoints work. If you come out ahead on 2 out of 3 decisions similar to this one, you'll win the event. Heh.

Steve Moese Pass Partner needs an opening hand or better for safety at the 4 level. Think of it this way. Opener will have 7 HCP on average leaving 33 for the 3 other players. We have our 10. Do you want to be in a 4 level contract with 20-22 HCP between us? Double is the alternative. Be ready for a 22 HCP Moysian 4 contract if you do.

Mike Ma Pass Worst vulnerability to be in, with us red and they white, and partner likely with $3+$ spades given her and RHO's pass of 3 . Partner's hand should be limited to 15-. Or give LHO 6 points for her preempt (she may be much weaker in this vulnerability, QJTxxxx and out is a legitimate 3 bid), then partner and RHO have 12 hcp each on the average. The upshot is game by our side is unlikely, especially with only 3 hearts. So I pass in spite of singleton spade and the need to protect partner having to pass with a decent hand but not short spades. Preempt works.

Bob Jones Pass We usually try to play in our 6-card minor, but this hand is strong enough to play in no trump. Pass.

Steve Vogel Pass This is a close one. In IMPs, I would choose to pass given that all of my points are in suits outside of diamonds. Partner should be able to make at least 1NT. In matchpoints, it is a closer decision, as diamonds will sometimes score higher than notrump, especially if partner has at least 3 diamonds. It's pretty close to a toss-up, but I would choose to pass in matchpoints too, rather than gamble at the 3-level.

Joe Muenks 2NT Your hand will take 2 more tricks in diamonds than NT almost every time, so we'll go to the 3 level to run from 1 NT. Use your transfer bid (2NT or 3\%).

Bob Fisk Pass This one is very close between passing and transferring to 3 to play there. With all six of my HCP's outside of my long suit, I'll choose to stay in 1 NT , although I wouldn't be surprised if that doesn't work out. That said, the auction isn't over, and if it continues with 2 M from lefty, pass from partner, and pass from righty, I have an easy 3 bid.

Steve Moese Pass While we have a 6-card diamond suit it is far from a source of tricks. 7 tricks might be easier than 9. We do have two potential entries. If Left Hand Opponent balances, we can back into 3 .

Mike Ma Pass Of course you would transfer to 2 M if your diamond suit is a M. But why play 2 level higher in a lower scoring strain when you have the balance of points and you have a suit that may lose 3-4 tricks .
