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Bob Jones 3V With 9 combined trumps (maybe more), you should be safe at the 3 level. Bid 3 .

Steve Vogel Pass At IMPs, I would unquestionably pass. At matchpoints, the decision is much closer. Yes, we have a 9-card fit, but my distribution is terrible, and I believe the risk of going down more than one (doubled) is too great.

Joe Muenks 3V Nine trump so 3 seems safe enough at this point. Note that partner will not be fooled into thinking I have a good hand since I failed to act last round, wary of more distribution or a few more HCP.

Bob Fisk 3V I would have bid $3 \boldsymbol{\text { B }}$ over $2 \boldsymbol{V}$, but better late than never I suppose. We bid to the level of total trump in a competitive auction, and we have at least nine trump between us (not you and me, but me and my partner....or should I say "I and my partner.").

Steve Moese 3- The bid I would have made one round earlier. Holding a 9 trump fit on a hand where opponents have 8-9 trumps themselves, bidding 3 over 3 will give them the last guess. East invited and west stayed below game. Give them 22 HCP. Partner should have an opening hand for their overcall. Pressure bidding,

Bob Jones 44 When partner invites and promises at least 4 trumps, you should always accept when you have a singleton. Bid 44.

Steve Vogel 4 True, I have an Aceless hand, but I tend to accept just about every invitational major suit 4-card raise when I have a normal opening hand and a side suit singleton.

Joe Muenks 49 A-ha, for a few years there before the pandemic, everyone was talking about their Losing Trick Count (LTC), but were applying it incorrectly on so many hands finding themselves going down too often. When you find a 9 card fit and have shortness, reel that LTC out to help you bid. Here we have 6 losers (AKQ per suit, so AQ Aソ, A>, AQs) so that's better than an opener by 1 trick, so game should be easy.

Bob Fisk 4쏘 Not bidding game would be a sin ("Thou shalt not not bid game" shows up as commandment \#11).

Steve Moese 4. With a 9-card fit and 6 losers, we can hardly stay out of game. With no Aces we bid game directly.

Bob Jones 4V/4@ Whether you bid spades or use a transfer, be sure you get to game.

Steve Vogel 4- (Transfer) An Ace-high 6-card major and a singleton value out to a game raise over a 2NT opener. Of course, we can construct hands where we will go down, but I expect to make game with the great majority of partner's possible holdings.

Joe Muenks 4- While I am 6-4 with the ace in my long suit, I figure a lucky slam is maybe $5 \%$ so not worth giving partner any choice but to only bid the game.

Bob Fisk 4- (Spades). Why is this one in here? I don't think I should push for slam, should me?

Steve Moese 4- The Texas Transfer to spades. They still pay bonuses for bidding and making games.

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Bob Jones 3NT Limited warranty here, but it would be cowardly not to bid 3NT.

Steve Vogel 3NT I have 8 tricks in my own hand, and if I can get 1 more from partner before the opponents run tricks in their own suit, I will make game. I would unquestionably make this bid non-vulnerable. It's more of a gamble vulnerable, but I also like the potential of keeping the opponents from finding their fit

Joe Muenks 3NT I don't know what's going on at this point but I want to make a forwardgoing bid and this is very forward of me, if I don't say so myself. Perhaps the opponents will forget to take the first 5 tricks by giving dummy a quick red king on the opening lead.

Bob Fisk 3NT If the opponents can take five red-suit tricks before I get in, the more power to 'em. Picture partner with $x x x$ Axxx xxxx xxx, and we make $3 N T$. Heh.

Steve Moese 3NT A gamble that partner can control the red suits and provide 1 additional trick. If they double we run to clubs.

Bob Jones 3NT Partner should have 18-20 and this hand should give him reasonable play for game. Bid 3NT.

Steve Vogel 3NT Partner's 2NT rebid shows values great than a 1NT overcall- in short 1920 HCP. My 6 points are game worthy.

Joe Muenks 3NT So we overcall 1NT holding a good 15 to a bad 18. Partner shows a huge hand, maybe 19-21, even 22 HCP, but I can't picture a slam or finding one without the heart fit at this point, so we'll bid 3NT and let partner score up 5 or 6 .

Bob Fisk 3NT Partner has 19-20 HCP and fewer than four Hearts. Bridge is easy!

Steve Moese 3NT Partner showed a NT hand in the range 19-21 HCP. They also have spades stopped well. 9 tricks are usually easier than 11. If partner had 4 hearts with us they would rebid $4 \vee$ not $2 N T$.

Bob Jones 3NT Partner should have 18-20 and this hand should give him reasonable play for game. Bid 3NT.

Bob Jones 3 You want to be in game, but which game? Bid 3 to check for 3-card spade support. Partner's next bid will tell you which game to bid.

Steve Vogel 3-Yet another close call. My side suit queens suggest a 3NT contract, but if partner has 3 spades, we may be short in one of the red suits. If I had a stronger hand with this same distribution, I would go directly to 3NT. With this hand, spades will often play better if we have a fit.

Joe Muenks 3 XYZ helps us handle all the bids following all continuations after 3 one level bids, but we still need that old stalwart the New Minor Forcing after opener's jump to 2NT, so 3 asks about opener's major suit holdings just to check on a 5-3 spade fit.

Bob Fisk 3 (Checkback). Whether you play Wolff Sign-Off or new-minor forcing, your bid here is the same. Partner will bid 4H with four Hearts, and then correct your 3NT bid to 4 holding 3 -card support.

Steve Moese 3-Partner's 18-19 is sufficient for game in either NT or spades. We ask partner for their spade support by bidding the OTHER minor. This is new minor forcing. Over the jump to $2 N T$, many play $3 \&$ as a puppet to 3 as an attempt to stop in a 3 -level suit contract. This convention is known as the Wolff Signoff ( and its big sister/brother the Wolff Relay). See:

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## Notes from Mike Ma:

1) Law of Total Tricks would say to bid 3 over 3 with 9 trumps vs 8 . Even if they have 8 only. But with 3433 , I treat our side as having 8 trumps, not 9 . Do they have 9 ? Who can tell these days with random bidding. I have had people jerked me around with 7 trumps total like this.
The thing is you can avoid this situation if you double $2 \boldsymbol{V}$, one of the few situations where stolen bids make sense. Now partner is in a good position to know what to do over 3C, and you are spared the decision.
Once fixed, stay fixed. I missed my chance at $2 \boldsymbol{V}$. Not going to play catch up now.

2) You only have 12 points. But you have $51 / 2$ losers ( 6 originally, but with 9 -card fit in trumps, you can deduct $1 / 2$ from you trump losers). So it is game on. It will depend on if partner has much wasted values in diamonds, but you have no way of knowing. When in doubt, bid game.

3) No idea why this is a problem Transfer to 4¢. With perfect fit (no waste in hearts), you may even have slam, but there is just no way to find out. And trying for 24-25 point slam with no space to explore is not fun. 2NT opening is not called a slam kicker for nothing. Even with a minor king, you still have no way to explore. As to transferring to $3 \boldsymbol{A}$ and passing, that is for the birds.

4) 3 NT You have 8 tricks in your hand. If you can bid $3 S$ to ask about the red suits, that may work. But this is one situation where it is ambiguous if $3 \mathbf{~} \mathbf{~ i s}$ ask or tell. There is no indication they can cash 5 tricks off the top. So a red suit ace from partner will make $3 N T$. Or other possibilities like $\boldsymbol{\Phi} \mathrm{K}$ and enough in red suits to stop them from taking 5 tricks right off.

2\% was a serious underbid with an 8 trick hand. You were lucky to get away with it.

3NT.
5) Partner has 19-21. We should be in game. But partner's $S$ don't have to be that robust like double stoppers. I bid now to give partner a choice. $3 \boldsymbol{2}$ is forcing. You do not bid over 2NT to improve a partial.

6) No idea why this is a problem. You bid Wollf signoff/NMF/check back.

Notice on a couple of these, you are playing catchup because of wrong or missed bids earlier in the auction, creating a problem when there should be none. A couple others were trivial, so not sure why they are presented in the quiz.
