ONE STEP FORWARD...

Summertime is a very active time for the Unit, Clubs and players in our area. Our snow bird friends are back in town, extra masterpoint games are offered at clubs, and there are many tournaments available. Gatlinburg, a 5-hour drive from Cincinnati, is the largest regional in North America every year. Did you know that after the host District (District 7), our District (District 11) sends more members than any other district?

Unfortunately, the data about tournament attendance shows that table counts are indeed in decline (I await official ACBL numbers for March and July – neither have been reported by Management yet). Nevertheless, Gatlinburg was down strongly year over year (7142.5 tables compared to 8113 in 2018 – that’s a 12% decline). We can expect District 11 tournaments to have fewer tables this year (Cincinnati was down about 7% from last year. Indianapolis was down about 10% earlier).

Is this decline temporary or permanent?

Data analyzed by David Rodney (ACBL Board of Governors District 6 – March 2019) and reviewed in the last issue of the ALERT looked at attendance for 760 regionals from 2013 to 2018. His findings are inescapable:


- 1) Players under 200 MPs are a major contributor to the decline in attendance even in the face of increases in Gold Rush Events.
- 2) Players over 70 years old average less than 0.5 regional tournaments a year.
- 3) Players do not travel more than 200 miles to play in a regional.

The data also shows that players above 2500 MPs travel often and play more sessions per tournament than their peers. The more MPs you have the more the more you travel! This should not surprise anyone.

Number of members attending Regionals



Distances members are traveling to Regionals



- Average distance = 219 miles, median distance = 58 miles
- Most attendance is local, though there is tremendous variation
- Tracking Regional attendance at same location over time can show patterns in changing attendance

Impact of Age on Attendance



- The number of regionals attended by each member declines after the age of 70
- These data have been consistent between 2013 and 2017
- The population has been aging and causing a decline in attendance
 - A 4% decline in attendance between 2013 and 2017 is directly due to aging
 - This decline will continue as ACBL membership continues to age

All of this shows the effects of the aging membership. We have reached the point where our demographics are going to cause tournaments to become smaller.

Clearly the data suggests the real opportunity is to get the 0-500 MP crowd out in force to these tournaments. Gold Rush and limited games (299er and 499er) are tailored to their needs. What is lacking is local promotion of the tournaments for these players. Players under 500 MPs represent almost 70% of our membership. Marketing 101.

Membership Growth

Everyone at all levels in the organization see membership growth as a fundamental strategy for Clubs, Units, Districts, and the ACBL as a whole. Would that it were so simple. First, we need to get more people who do not know how to play bridge playing bridge. That's easier said than done.

Membership data for this quarter shows District 11 is 25th out of 25 Districts (that's right – dead last) when it comes to membership growth (we are 17th in size). Our recruiting rate is a bit above 5% just short of average (6%) but our attrition rate is a touch above 9% - so we are losing just under 4% of our members each year. Age and income related causes are understandable and largely unavoidable. However, focusing effort on retaining existing members should be a top priority for all Unit Membership Committees. We have to attack this problem at both ends – growing new members and slowing our attrition rate.

This clearly shows how much work there is to do to shore up membership decline. Our tournaments and our clubs depend on new members.

Unit 124 has very active Education and Membership functions. There has been great effort invested in creating new certified teachers, creating an attractive introductory curricula for Osher Lifelong Learning classes, and providing Come and Play bridge opportunities at the Cincinnati Bridge Center. We hope this will bear fruit over time. Emphasis is being placed on welcoming new members and helping them socialize with other bridge players. This can only help with member retention.

Finally, we ask all members to refer friends and family to our Introduction to Bridge program – word of mouth is the overwhelming way we recruit new ACBL members. If you want ideas how to engage friends and relatives in learning the game of bridge, contact me or any Board members, any member of the Education Committee, and the Unit 124 website itself for ways to engage.

It's not too early now to consider bringing your time and talents to the Board of Directors. Candidates will be identified in August for a three-year term beginning January 2, 2020. Simply get the Nomination Form at <http://www.cincybridge.com/Election%20Petition.htm> and have 10 members sign it to secure your name on the ballot.

This is another great issue thanks to our faithful contributors. Dean Congbalay continues his delightful thought pieces on the social aspects of our game. Thanks to the direction from the Unit Education Committee and the Unit Board of Directors, we sponsored a Best Practices Teachers Workshop in Cincinnati on Monday through Wednesday of the Week of the Flying Pig Regional. The District is

committed to contributing to stakeholder needs at our Regional Tournaments. Patti Tucker (Grand Life Master, Easley Blackwood Award recipient for lifetime achievement) and Grace Major (the author of the Best Practices Teacher workshop) presented the workshop at the Cincinnati Bridge Center on Monday and Tuesday. A total of 18 people attended. 5 were from Ontario Canada, 2 from Illinois and 1 from Michigan. 10 were from District 11. Unit 124 members successfully completing the training were: Greg Brinker, Harriet Edwards, Mike Ma, John Meinking, Steve Moese, and Herb Schapera. In addition, Amy Gerowitz and Jane Duncan were certified.

This training is usually offered at NABC Tournaments and at Gatlinburg – large venues. The Unit decided we needed to support training and certification of new bridge teachers to reinforce our effort to introduce more people to bridge and to help create new members for the ACBL.

The Unit Board decided to offer the training at \$100 per person. (Certification was \$25 extra payable directly to the ACBL). The ACBL charges \$1700 flat fee for the training. They provide the trainers and materials, and require space and hospitality contributions (along with certain visual aids – flip charts).

Originally, we had 25 teachers enrolled and paid. However, 2 dropped out because they felt the SAYC quiz required to take this course was an insult to them. Two had health emergencies and 3 had unforeseeable conflicts.

Net, the Unit contributed the CBC space and \$560 out of pocket (Dinners for the teachers, hospitality foods, and flip charts) toward 8 teachers in the Unit.

In addition, when any new teacher completes two courses of introductory bridge to new people within Unit 124, the Unit will reimburse their training cost (Here \$100 or \$125

depending on whether they completed the certification exam).

The Unit 124 commitment to growth and to education is substantial.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE NEWS

I wish I had better membership news to report. After a strong first quarter, only a hand full of new members joined the CBA during the past three months. Declining membership continues to be a significant issue for all regions of the ACBL, and unfortunately, in spite of our efforts we are not bucking this trend. The bottom line is that the aging demographic of bridge players is a significant headwind that we must work to overcome.

On a national level, the ACBL is resourcing initiatives to attract new members. They recently invited 25 clubs/teachers to join a membership Beta Testing Team to evaluate membership recruitment initiatives. As new members are recruited, the beta testers will receive automatic notifications and, at the beginning of each month, a full statement will be sent detailing all recruitment activity. The ACBL will share any insights they gain from this initiative. The ACBL is also working on a strategic marketing plan that is strongly focused on Digital Marketing. Their goal is to promote bridge and its benefits, so more people – especially those in the 50 -65 age segment – start considering adopting bridge as a hobby. They are also working with IT, Education and Club Services to improve teacher and club directories, to ensure that current and future players can find teachers and clubs in their area when visiting the ACBL website.

At home, the CBA website already has a lot of information on classes and educational opportunities. If you haven't visited it lately please check it out <http://www.cincybridge.com/> – and share it with any of your friends and acquaintances who might be interested in bridge.

To help transition new and rubber bridge players to duplicate bridge, our Education Committee is now holding practice duplicate games, and at least one teacher is now teaching a duplicate class. Come and Play, the 0-20 game and feedback from OLLI class students has been very positive.

The Membership Committee is reaching out to all new members who have not yet picked up their badges and we are running an NLM Sectional on October 4th and 5th. Our efforts to recruit from social bridge clubs and Next Door have not yet been effective. We are supporting the Education Committee since their classes and initiatives are aligned with membership objectives and what better way to recruit new members than to focus on those who have already expressed interest in bridge by taking a class.

Despite the efforts allocated to the above-mentioned objectives, by far the most effective way to recruit new members has been by personal referral – members inviting friends.

What can you do to help our club remain vibrant? Volunteer! When the Education Committee reaches out and asks for volunteers to monitor Come and Play or an OLLI class, step up and volunteer. Let Larry Newman, the Education Committee Chair, know if you can help out. You can also continue to do your part to make the CBA an inviting and supportive place to play. Take to heart the messages on the new table cards. Be supportive of newer players. Games are a lot more fun with more tables.

Have a nice rest of the Summer! I'm off to Northern Wisconsin soon, and fishing, hiking and swimming in a lake are beckoning. I hope you have something fun planned as well!

Who Needs to Bid Well?

Pete the Plumber was well known in his chosen profession. His specialty was cleaning up other peoples' messes. No matter how you managed to bollix up your drain pipes or inside plumbing, Pete always found a way to find the solution. His bridge playing was very similar with one critical difference. He was often the one to create the mess! But Pete made up for it by seemingly always finding the right line of play. Here is an example from a regional in Cleveland a few years back.

Playing in a pairs tournament, this is the wild bidding you witness with Pete sitting South vulnerable against not.

The purpose of this article is not to explain good bidding technique, as that would be impossible with this illustration. Let me try and explain the thinking of the participants. Having a passed hand, West decided to show both majors with one bid, even though 5-4-2-2 is a less-than-desirable pattern for a two-suited overcall. With modest values and a singleton in partner's first bid suit, North was more inclined to penalize their major suit choice so weighed in with a double. East had such a flat hand, horrible for offense, but he fell in love with his major suit holdings so asked partner to take a choice at the 3 level. Pete, with no sense of knowing when to hold 'em and when to fold 'em, rebid his suit at the 4 level with modest values to say the least.

Now West fell from grace when he decided to answer his partner's question without stopping to realize that once South took a call, he was no longer required to respond. Now North started salivating, as well he should and said "Not through the Iron Duke" and put the double card on the table. Pete, who sometimes appeared to be playing solitaire, decided to introduce his second suit at the 5 level. North was a bit peeved, but realized Pete had no hearts and a big (!) minor suit hand and took him to slam. East thought about hitting it, but was aware of Pete's reputation for fixing messes and grudgingly passed.

When you are on lead against distributional hands, and especially where you know the opponents don't have the high cards and must make the hand by crossruffing, it is vital to lead a trump. Against this hand it would not have worked and West found the inspired lead of the heart ace on which his partner encouraged. Pete showed to sign of concern but he immediately knew getting 12 tricks on the hand was in jeopardy as he was being shortened in trumps at trick one. Further he knew a crossruff could not succeed as he would collect 8 trumps and 2 side suit aces for 10 tricks. Therefore, he had to set up the ♦ suit.

He began by ruffing in hand and playing ace and another diamond. Both following with West playing the queen and king. He played a club to the queen in his hand and led his last diamond. West discarded a spade. He was looking at this with dummy to play:

He knew that if he ruffed with the 9 he could draw a round of trump with the king but would then have no way to his hand. West had already shown 9 or 10 cards in the majors and had followed to two diamonds and one club. Realizing that there was no hope if East had 4 trumps to the Jack and that he would most certainly lose control of the hand if he ruffed with the 9 (after he played the trump King his only entry to his hand was ruffing a heart with the singleton trump ace-end of story and contract!). On a spade lead, the opponents would win and play a heart from with hand making him ruff with the singleton Ace. Again, losing control. He made the only play that gave him a chance to make the hand.

He trumped with the ♣K and played the remaining ♣9 to his ten which held. He drew the last trump and claimed, losing one spade. Here was the entire hand:

Pete's reputation remained intact. The moral of the story is even if your bidding is hopeless, at least learn how to play the hand!

North played Ace-King of hearts, followed by a low diamond. Declarer played the 9, and South won his King. A club return allowed

North to trump, and another low diamond was placed on the table. Mikael naturally played the ten, as South won the Jack. Another club return was ruffed, followed by a diamond ruff, another club ruff, a second diamond ruff as declarer pitched his remaining club. Another club, however, allowed North to overruff declarer with his remaining Jack.

If you've been counting, that's 6 trumps, 2 hearts, and 2 diamonds -- down 6! Plus 600 was a nice pickup of 9 IMPs against a less successful defense at the other table.



Much More Than HCP

Dave Dressman, a mentor, teacher, friend, moderator of the NKy Bridge Blog, and player at the Northern Kentucky Bridge Club came up to me today with a hand. He said I would find it interesting. I now know Dave has a penchant for understatement. The hand came from the A/B/C Swiss teams, a two session event running in parallel with the Gold Rush Swiss Teams.

At first glance, these were two very different auctions. One south decided their distribution was so extreme it was worth opening with a 1-bid. Both NS pairs played in a Major suit game. While Dave offered no explanation of the bidding, it would appear North at table 1 made a cuebid raise of ♠,

showing Invitational or better hand with trump support. North's 3N appears to be the "Non-serious" 3NT. This is a slam exploration convention that allows responder to distinguish between hands with good slam prospects from

hands with poor slam prospects. The thinking is once your side has found a 9-card fit in a major, playing in 3N is unlikely to be better than playing in that major.

So, rather than leave 3N as a choice of games bid, experts use 3N to separate good slam hands from so-so slam hands. Non-serious 3N means you have a hand that is making only a weak effort toward slam. Playing this way, the direct cue bid of say 4♣ would be a "serious" slam try in a hand with extra values. (Like everything else in bridge you can turn the concept on its head and play it the other way. 3N would be the serious slam try, while a cue bid at the 4-level would be a "non-serious" try).

On inspection, we can see that NS are able to make 12 tricks in either major. There are no defensive ruffs on opening lead. Trumps can be drawn in 2 rounds, and there's only 1♦ trick to lose. Notice that EW can make 10 tricks in either minor suit. So let's make a little table:

The Law of Total Tricks

The Law of Total Tricks goes back to Jean-Rene Vernes in a Bridge World article from June, 1969. Vernes said if we add the longest trump fit in NS to the longest trump fit in EW, the total number of trumps will equal the total number of tricks each side can take. Here we see that there are 22 total trumps and that NS can make 12 tricks, EW 10, or 22 total tricks. This approximation is called the Law of Total Tricks. This "Law" is accurate for decisions when to bid to the 3-level, but can be off by 2 or more total tricks when both sides have large trump fits. Expert bidding practices to reveal total trump length in both hands include: Support doubles, Jacoby 2 NT, Bromad, Bergen Raises, Splinters, Mini-Splinters just to name a few. Raising a weak two to the three level on 3-card support and nothing else? Yep, that's the Law of Total Tricks again. Indeed, expert practice is to bid to the 3 level when holding 9 trumps – so the partner who knows the trump count makes that decision.

Larry Cohen's book on the Law of Total Tricks ties in vulnerability more effectively to trump length. He guides how high to compete more effectively than using simple HCP alone. Say we are EW. The thinking follows along these lines. If we have a 12-card trump fit, and the opponents have a 10-card trump fit, then if they are making 12 tricks, we should make 10 tricks. If the opponents bid a slam in their best suit(s), what should we do? If they bid their slam, we score - 980 points. If we bid to a 7-level contract and are doubled, we will go down 3 vulnerable, or -800. -800 is a better score than allowing opponents to make a small slam. So, should we bid the 7♣ sacrifice? The answer is a clear NO unless we have double dummy information like we do here. At the table we have much less information about how many trumps each side has. The result of imperfect information will be that we will err in our estimate of the total tricks. -800 could easily be -1100 or -1400. Sacrificing Vulnerable against NV opponents is losing bridge.

Anders Wirgen and Mike Lawrence took on the Law of Total Tricks and found the variability too high for accurate bidding decisions, particularly as the total trump number grew past 18. They argued that Working Points is a better way to view what causes hands to take tricks. For them, shortness in side suits is very valuable. They almost got it right, but their solution is complicated and requires

information not readily available at the time we need to make our final bidding decision.

Steve Bloom (BridgeWinners Series “The Theory of Total Tricks”) <http://bridgewinners.com/article/view/the-theory-of-total-tricks-part-i-history-and-application-2/> does a great job moving from Vernes correlation to an understandable cause and effect estimator for tricks we can take. The concept is simple – we add our own two longest fits. The Total Tricks we can take are the second fit total (SF) plus 3 tricks if the hands are very pure (all power in length and none in short suits) Total Tricks = SF+3. However for hands with wasted values in short suits, the estimate is TT=SF+2. Steve (rightly) concludes that the so called “Law” is a correlation based on the true cause- **the second suit fit**.

Wait a minute, what does this have to do with the price of bananas? What about the hand you say?

Well for the HCP adherents among us, they will scoff and protest – who in their right mind worries about bidding a slam on only 23 high card points? Or how about, “Who considers sacrificing against slam when you hold 3 defensive tricks?”

This hand is an exciting example that shows neither HCP nor loser count takes tricks. Tricks come from setting up long suits. Bid more when you have great length and a double fit, and when your honor cards are working in long suits and not wasted in short ones.

Do you think you should open the South hand 1♠? Why don't you go see what many Experts say: <http://bridgewinners.com/article/view/bidding-problem-12497-3/>

Here's how I'd want to see the bidding go. I think South should pass. We appear to own the two top ranking suits. Our distribution is great and we have a source of tricks. South passes the 7-5-1-0 hand, and West opens 1♣. North makes a 1♥ overcall. East jumps to 3♣ thinking Preempt! South can make a control bid implying shortness and good trumps. North has losers in the pointed suits and simply bids game. South figures their SF = about 20 or so, based on the bidding so far. East will wake up and bid the 5♣ sacrifice (notice how much better it would have been to bid 5♣ immediately. Bid to the level of your trumps. Here 11 trumps means the 5 level. The benefit of doing so immediately is we give the opponents the last guess. If we don't we will be making the last guess. Let the opponents do it.

The Law of Total Tricks goes back to Jean-Rene Vernes in a Bridge World article from 1969 (Vernes, June, 1969). Vernes found a statistical connection between the lengths of each side's longest suits and the number of tricks available in those trump contracts. Vernes' work was new and revolutionary, but only in the way it quantified the importance of trump length. As Danny Kleinman wrote (Kleinman, 2013) in a letter to me:

“The value of additional cards in a trump suit for offense was known, though not measured, from before the invention of contract bridge.”

As he pointed out, S. J. Simon had written, almost seventy years ago (Simon, 1946),

“It has probably never occurred to you that a fit in partner's suit is a disadvantage in doubling a contract in another suit. Reflect on it and it becomes obvious. The fact that, between you, you hold most of the suit, means that the enemy holds few of it. And therefore, you cannot hope to make many tricks in that suit.”

Kleinman actually published a penalty double rule well before the Vernes study:

Do not double an opponent's suit for penalties at a level lower than the number of cards you have in your partner's suit.

Replace “double ... for penalties” with “sell out” and we have the modern playbook of competitive bidding written fifty years ago.

The Importance of Total Tricks

It is Matchpoints, with no one vulnerable, and the bad guys have bid quickly up to three spades. Do you defend or take the plunge? Bidding to make is always nice, but

you can gain even when you don't make. Losing 100 in four clubs doubled is better than paying out 140 if three spades makes. This is where Total Tricks enters the arena. Suppose a little birdie whispered to you,

"There are 18 Total Tricks ready to take on this hand."

By that, the birdie means

Tricks in spades (their way) + tricks in clubs (played our way) = 18.

It is then absolutely clear to bid. Let's suss this out with a simple table:

| Tricks in ♠ | Tricks in ♣ | Par Result Defending | Par Result Bidding |
|-------------|-------------|----------------------|--------------------|
| 7 | 11 | 300 | 400 (150) |
| 8 | 10 | 100 | 130 |
| 9 | 9 | -140 | -100 |

Of course they haven't bid their game yet in the last case, and partner might not raise four clubs to five in the first, so maybe those don't count. Otherwise, bidding is a winner in every case, and wins easily in the two middle cases, which are more likely.

Do we have such a birdie? Yes, Vernes' law is our birdie, since Vernes predicted:

The total number of tricks on a given deal is, on average, the total number of trumps held by each side.

So, let's say the bidding goes to you. You can expect partner to be approximately 1-4 in the majors. If you are 3-5 in the majors, then you can count a nine card spade fit, and a nine card heart fit. 18 trumps, and so 18 tricks. Your birdie tells you to bid four hearts without even looking at the rest of your hand.

This is an exaggeration, of course, and expert authors have written quite a bit on adjusting the Total Trick count, but estimating trumps, and using that to judge competitive auctions, has become the standard framework for all modern expert bridge players. Take a look at Kit's Corner in this forum and you will see countless references to the number of expected total trumps in competitive decisions.

There was even a Rodwell invention in vogue for a short while: After a one heart opening and a one or two spade overcall,

4 ♥ = four more hearts than spades

4 ♦ = three more hearts than spades

4 ♣ = two more hearts than spades.

Using these methods, opener would know the exact total trump count should the next hand bid four spades, and would be incredibly well-placed to make a five-level decision. This invention certainly shows how deeply this Vernes Law has permeated modern bridge.

So, Vernes found a remarkable connection between the number of trumps held by both sides, and the tricks available on offense and defense. This statistical link has been verified in major studies, but, as of now, there doesn't seem to be any theoretical basis for the amazing Law.

I find that very frustrating. Maybe it's the mathematician in me, but I want to figure out how things work – I want to see the proof. I have spent quite a long time exploring total tricks, and trying to develop a working theory. Finally, things are falling into place. In this series, I am going to explore total tricks, trying to develop a complete theory, from the ground up. Stay tuned.

What Happens in Vegas

Up at 3:30 AM to catch an early direct flight from CVG to Las Vegas. The flight left a bit late, but three hours sleep onboard was small compensation. I arrived at 7:30 AM Thursday and took a shuttle (\$20 RT) to Planet Hollywood. We stayed at Planet Hollywood for 4 nights and then switched to the Cosmopolitan for 4 nights. The Cosmo didn't have availability for Sunday night so we had to make due. I waited in the Starbucks for my partner to arrive (PH had no lounge that wasn't a bar and wanted extra for a room I could have by 11 AM. Bridge began at 1PM so Starbucks it was).

Walking to the Cosmo from Planet Hollywood (just across the street) was confusing the first few times. We finally settled on the Miracle Mile Shops Exit and avoided as much of the Casino as possible. Returning at night was loud, raucous, and full of partiers. Could not avoid second hand smoke no matter where we walked.

The breakfast buffet at PH was uninspired. The made-to-order omelets were ok. While the discounted price was just over \$20 with a small tip, value was lacking. We tried a Mexican restaurant in the Miracle Mile shops and found a good \$4.95 2-egg breakfast. Several places offered this deal. We focused on PBR at the strip entrance to the Mall for the rest of the trip. One visit to the breakfast buffet in the Cosmo was enough to cure us of any repeat interest. \$32 pp w/o tip made this a poor value even for the higher quality offerings.

Dinner the first evening brought out the negatives of using a smart phone app inside a hotel complex - maps don't work. We went to Eataly and found the food pricey (\$24 for pasta and water) and the place noisy. The walk from the hotels in 110 °F heat put us off returning (we never explored using the tram). Wolfgang Pucks Cucina had great food and high value offerings at their bar. We ate pizza for dinner twice. Yes, the pizza there was that good. Super toppings and flavors, and a crunchy chewy thin crust to die for. The steak sandwich was superb. Hattie's Spicy Chicken and Secret Pizza in the Cosmo were good but again pricey. For example, a full pizza was over \$30, and 3 slices and a water cost over \$20. Hattie's charged \$5 for unsweetened Iced tea and allowed only 1 refill (32 oz total). Dinner at The Henry (Cosmo) was a highlight. Great sandwiches and meal plates in a comfortable open setting where it was quiet enough to have a conversation.

The highlight meal was at Momofuku. David Chen's Asian fusion restaurant was more than its reputation. The menu while focused (limited is inaccurate) offered great plates. I settled on the Pork Belly Buns, Spicy Pickles and an off

menu Black Truffle noodle bowl. I recommend all three plates without reservation. The Black Truffle Noodles are to die for. (I eschewed the additional duck confit. The bowl was indeed rich enough).

The first hand worthy of comment (there were many) happened in the first round of the Von Zedwitz NABC Pairs. This event is a three-day double qualifier. This from the third board we played in the afternoon (first session):

The auction was uneventful (1♦) – 4♠ - (DBL) – All Pass. I was West. At first glance it looks like we have 3 losers – a fast trump loser a fast ♦ loser and a slow club loser. If we can ruff a C in dummy, the slow loser goes away.

Trick 1: ♦K – ♦4 – ♦8 – ♦10 (♦8 discourages)

Trick 2: ♠6 – ♠2 – ♠A – ♠3

Trick 3: ♠10 – ♠4 – ♣4 – ♠J

Now we need a plan B. Since this is match Point Pairs an overtrick would be worth its weight in gold. Do you see how? When holding a long suit, running the suit will either produce a squeeze or induce a carding error in your favor.

Trick 4: ♥J – ♥8 – ♥A – ♥2

Trick 5: ♠K – ♣2 – ♥4 – ♦7

Trick 6: ♠Q – ♥3 – ♥7 – ♥5

Trick 7: ♠9 – ♥6 – ♦5 – ♣6

Trick 8: ♠8 – ♦3 – ♥9 – ♦2

Trick 9: ♠7 – ♥K – ♦6 – ♦J

Trick 10: ♠5 - ♦Q??!! - ♥10 - ????

The potential double squeeze was a pseudo squeeze.

North's discard of the DQ was a blunder – likely thinking that partner protected that suit, but not anticipating

that that the ♦Q was the only thing stopping partner from being squeezed in the 4-card ending. True, the Double

Squeeze was not there as North can (should) protect the red suits and abandon Clubs to partner. South will have to keep ♣QJ10 and discard their ♦A to hold EW to 10 tricks. When the double squeeze failed, the error created a simple squeeze for the overtrick. An 86% board is not a bad way to start. Here is the full hand.

A double Squeeze requires that one opponent guard one suit, and the other a second suit, with the third suit being guarded by both. By rearranging just two

cards in the opponents hands in a non-material way, we have a pure double squeeze:

Now on the logical lead of the ♦K, the red suit menaces are isolated – North guards ♥ and South guards ♦ and both guard ♣. The ♦9 is now a true threat card against South and the ♥10 is a threat card

against North. The ♣7 is now the threat card in the suit they both control. Note the importance of the ♣A as an entry to dummy to reach the threat cards there. In this arrangement, if North holds 3 ♣ cards he surrenders to the ♥J. So North will pitch down to 2 ♣ and the ♥K. South now must hold onto the ♦A (♦9 threat) and that leaves room for only 2 ♣ cards. Declarer's ♣3 can score the overtrick.

It's useful to see here that the circumstances for a pure squeeze require specific card placement. However if the cards are placed approximately right, a pseudo squeeze might be operating that could fool even sound opponents.

Meetings

From an ACBL administration standpoint I found the week modestly disappointing. I had arranged my travel to arrive 2 days early to join a putative Board meeting with the Governance Task Force on Friday, only to find that the meeting would not happen. Late decisions closed the meeting to work on aligning 17 of the 25 board members to a change scope that could be supported. Progress will be slow here. For now, the Board will focus on how to create skilled committees to whom they can delegate much of the current workload. This first small step is long overdue and I support it. I have no confidence the Board will find a way to reduce its size. Work here continues. Yes, I was disappointed that the joint meeting did not occur. Yes, I didn't like spending time and money (travel plans made well ahead of a meeting that was not as firm as plans in Memphis made the meeting seem) only to have the objective change late in the plans.

The Membership meeting and the Board of Governors meeting were held on Sunday. This year the ACBL called the membership meeting for 9:00 AM separating it from the Board of Governors (BoG) meeting. This change was announced in the July Bulletin as required by the bylaws. However, were it not for Stu Goodgold's note in Bridgewinners I would not have been aware of the change. The putative reason for the change was to allow more time for the BoG meeting.

The effect of this change was poor IMHO. Only 47 people showed for the membership meeting against a quorum of 250. Then the Management proceeded to give their full report (ACBL President, ACBL Management, ACBL France, ACBL legal) to this small meeting. This meant the 100+ BoG members in attendance at the 10 AM meeting got an abbreviated version of these facts. This means communication with the BoG suffered in this new meeting design. Indeed the number of people more than tripled for the 10 AM meeting. So sad.

Monday was the start of the Spingold. Partners from past NABCs arranged for us to play in the Spingold where we entered the qualifying round in 4-way. In this particular plan, two teams play head to head for 32 boards. The winners go to the round of 64 the following day. The losers have to play off in the evening, the winner continuing on and the loser out. There were 98 teams at the start of the Spingold. That led to 19 head to head matches (top 19 vs bottom 19) and 15 4-way matches. We drew Hill (J Lall, Dwyer, Huang) as our first opponent. The first half had us trailing by 12. Then the client dropped out and play began in earnest. After 32 boards we were ready to play the evening round. We drew a 6-

person team with Max Schierson and Debbie Rosenberg for the second half. Our lead at the half was 4 IMPs.

You fan your cards in third seat and see

♠8 ♥A10 ♦AKQ9874 ♣1072

This is an opening hand in 2/1 or Precision. Your partner in first seat opens 2♦. This artificial opening is a special gadget your partner wanted. It shows a hand with exactly 4441 shape. If 11-15 HCP, partner will have a singleton ♦. With 16+ HCP partner will have any singleton. You have one gadget, 2N, to ask about partner's strength and shortness so you trot that bid out. Partner replies 3♥, showing a 16-18 HCP hand with shortness in one of the minor suits. You would like to know which minor partner is short in. If ♣, You might be able to make 6♦. If ♦ then perhaps 6N can come home. However, you never discussed continuations here. You have 8 tricks. Partner is much more likely to be short in D than C. You have no tool for asking Aces here as no suit is yet agreed. It is theoretically possible that partner holds KQJx KJ10x x KQJx You try 4N hoping partner knows this is Blackwood (no RKB as we have not agreed a suit). Partner responds 5H (showing 2 Aces). Now its trivial to ask 5N and hear 6H (2 Kings) to which we answer 6N. There was no struggle to the play as D split 3-2 (68%) and a supported Q gave us all 13 tricks. Partner's hand was AKQ10 K942 6 AJ98. This won us 13 IMPs as the opponents unexpectedly stopped in game.

I found the use of unfamiliar conventions and incomplete discussion of follow-ups very annoying. Next time I need to plan better.

Unfortunately, our opponents found a 29 HCP slam we didn't sniff at (it made on a finesse) and bid to a minor suit game when our 3N went down 1. Losing wasn't fun, but playing in the Spingold is a great experience.

The bridge venues on the 3rd and 4th floors of the Cosmopolitan were good. All were well lit (I really liked the 12+ lantern lights they added to the 4th floor ballroom. These should be available for all future venues where high ceilings and dim light make for good parties and poor cardplaying). The bathrooms were impeccable throughout the week. The only complaint I'd offer is to stagger the game breaks so that all games do not have a rest break at the same time and the bathrooms are not overwhelmed by poor scheduling.

Directors were prompt, courteous, and helpful. I was involved in no hearing but was near one or two ZT instances that were handled very well. Kudos to the directors.

Bridge was fun. Results wallowed in average. We played in NABC events whenever possible. Thoroughly enjoyed losing to the Hill team in the 4-way. Playing at Kevin Dwyer's / Shaun Huang's table was a treat. Friday was a travel day and partner and I decided to play in one side game session before running off to the airport. Pushing cards got us a 62% that had eluded us all week.

Costs for the trip were up. Las Vegas is not as amenable to AirBnB. Car rental and parking all but eliminate savings. So I booked at site hotels because heat makes alternatives less appealing.

My share of expenses look like this:

This trip cost was double anything I've spent in the past 4 years. Vegas was not cheap. Traveling to NABC's takes a lot of cash. This is another reason to take advantage of the NABC in Columbus this coming March 2020. A great venue and a great value for us "locals".

Final thought: The Cosmo was a superior playing venue. The total costs were too high. The rest of Vegas gets in the way for non-gamblers.

Post Script

In the shuttle to the long-term parking lot a traveler found himself in a pinch. His wife left her passport in the car and he was returning to get it. He had 50 minutes to make his plane. The transport runs every 15 minutes or so but he had to clear security. I offered him a ride to the terminal. He was on his way to Vegas for a conference, Got him there in 10 minutes. I hope he made it.
